

Girl Scouts Set Up In Cottage Grove

COTTAGE GROVE — Girl Scouting in Cottage Grove has been reorganized through the Lane county unit. Forty-six girls attended the first meeting Tuesday evening in the recreation room of the Presbyterian church. Miss Jacqueline Judd, field secretary for the Eugene-Lane county office, was in charge of the meeting. She was assisted in the organization details by Mrs. Dale Gates and Mrs. Gaylord Davies. The meeting was opened by the presentation of the colors. Miss Judd explained to the girls the purposes of scouting, what was expected of them, and how a troop was organized. She handed out check lists to the members, on which they indicated their present interests and their abilities to be developed through scouting. She also answered questions the girls asked about scouting. Miss Judd taught a folk dance which the girls enjoyed immensely. The meeting was closed by the repeating of the Girl Scout promise.

Miss Marjory Stewart, executive secretary of the Eugene Girl Scout council, accompanied Miss Judd to Cottage Grove and assisted the leaders in their plans. It is expected that two or three troops will eventually be organized in this city. The American Legion Auxiliary have announced their intention of sponsoring a troop.

In discussing the need for more leaders, Miss Judd said that in order to provide scouting for the number of girls who turned out, additional troop leaders will need to be secured. She also said that Girl Scouting is on the list of jobs vital to the war effort.

It was announced that any girl between the ages of 10 and 14, inclusive who might be interested in becoming a Girl Scout is invited to attend the next meeting on Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 17 in the Jefferson school gymnasium at 3:45 o'clock. It is requested, however, that any girl wishing to join the troop, be accompanied by a parent or guardian. It will then be possible for the parents to meet Miss Judd and talk over the troop activities with her.
