Green said that Tobin had reiterated to Murphy an earlier statement that he knew nothing about the fight until the following day. Murphy told reporters that Tobin and other AFL officials he saw in New York were "extremely cooperative."

Both the navy officers, Murphy stated, will be asked to make affidavits prior to the senate committee's Oct. 18 meeting. The two asserted previously that a fight developed at the hotel when members of the union, leaving the dinner at which the president spoke, asked them about their voting intentions.

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their armor, guns and infantry southward behind the west wall to man the breach that will be created when Aachen is finally mopped-up.

While the bombers struck the heaviest blows to hamper this maneuver, the British 2nd army was grinding against the forefield of the westwall's defenses in the Overloon area of central Holland and striking for the communications hub of Venray, three miles south of Overloon and eight miles from the German frontier.

Pied Forward To the southwest, British and Canadian troops were plodding forward in their drive to clear the Schelde estuary for passage of ships to Antwerp. On the south bank, amphibious troops, drove south from Biervliet toward a junction with a Canadian force from the Leopold canal, squeezing the Germans into an ever tighter pocket near the mouth of the river.

On the north side of the river, the Canadians worked out farther on the neck of the Beveland peninsula after repulsing the third heavy counterattack in as many days from the Bergen-op-Zoom area just northeast of where the peninsula meets the mainland.

Far to the south allied troops of the 6th army group virtually isolated Le Thillot, guarding the Belfort gap, by capturing a road junction just northeast of it and secured a road leading into Bus-sang pass, one of the main Vosges passes.

Commercial Fertilizer Trials Are Started

Two commercial fertilizer trials on established plantings of alta fescue, to be harvested for seed, were started last week by Dan Young, assistant county agent. They were on the farms of Bart Flanagan and Ash Bailey in the Junction City area.

The fertilizers used were ammonium sulphate and superphosphate, applied alone and in combination. Also on one plot in each trial the stubble was mowed and raked off.

Representative samples from each plot will be harvested and the yields will be compared with that of the remainder of the field.

These trials are being established on recommendation of the crop improvement committee of the Lane county agricultural council.

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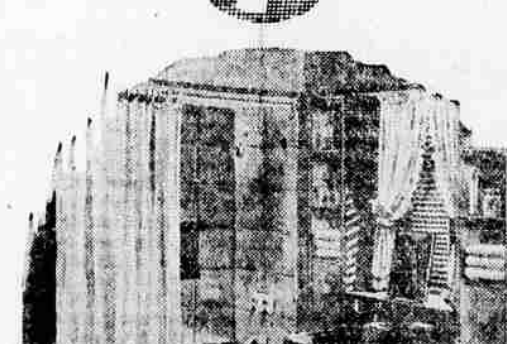
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
