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(DUE TO COLDS)

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WALLPAPER—OPEN SESAME TO BEAUTY

No cultured people were ever content to sit and face bare walls. Even in olden times they hung their booty and trophies as mural decorations. The more cultured the race the more they craved decoration. Today, of course, we are fortunate to be able to express this artistic urge in many ways. One of the best means at our disposal is well-designed wallpaper. It gives us pattern and color in a harmonious effect that enhances any interior.

In choosing wallpaper, you must take into consideration the size, height, character, and light of the room. The color, design, and feeling of the paper should conform to these requirements. When selecting your patterns keep in mind the physical characteristics of the house and its rooms. You can depend on color to establish the atmosphere or mood, as well as the color scheme of any particular room. But no matter what your decorating problem, you will be sure to find an Imperial wallpaper to suit your needs. Just consider the four lovely papers photographed above. They are varied as to pattern and color. In fact you could do an entire house with the papers in this group.

At the lower right, for instance, is an all over design that can be used in any type of room. The white-leaved vines intertwine with green-blue leaves and rose-colored flowers against a soft rose background. This arrangement of leaves and flowers is taken from eighteenth century Chinese papers and is at its best with mahogany furniture.

The paper shown at the lower left is best suited to halls, dining rooms or bedrooms. The pattern consists of architecturally framed medallions, showing a shepherd and shepherds, suspended by ribbons from flowered garlands. The color scheme is made of rose-coral tones as accents against yellow-greens and tones of soft blue. The motifs were inspired by English needlework of the late eighteenth century.

At the upper left is a charming paper showing baskets of apples set in openings of a blue lattice against a clear yellow background. This design is without period precedent, but is particularly well suited to "country" furniture, such as early American farmhouse pieces, or Pennsylvania or French Provincial painted pieces. It would look best in a hallway above a dado, or in a small dining room, and would be ideal in a modern kitchen.

Last, but by no means least, is the striking paper shown at the upper right. The pattern is most effective, consisting of over-scaled tulips in lilac and aubergine tones combined with white and yellow and set with white plumes against a green-blue ground. This paper was designed for "casual rooms" where brilliant color and sharp contrasts would not be tiring. It is best for small foyers, dressing-rooms or baths, or for only part of a large room, where a plain color can be used to give the patterned paper an architectural importance. Although the colors of these papers are color-locked, they are highly resistant to light and you can wash off dirt and finger marks. They are now on display at

Sgt. Paul Locklear Receives DFC Medal

Staff Sergeant Paul L. Locklear, 23, top turret gunner on the B-24 Liberator, "The Sooner," has been awarded the distinguished flying cross for "extraordinary achievement" during eighth air force bombing attacks on targets in Germany and Nazi-occupied Europe.

Sergeant Locklear is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Locklear, River Road, Eugene. His wife, Mrs. Ruby Locklear, lives in Los Angeles. A graduate of Amarillo, Tex., high school, the sergeant was employed by the Lockheed Aircraft Corporation in Burbank, Calif., and the Lockheed Overseas Corporation in Northern Ireland before entering the army air forces.

A member of the 3rd bombardment division, cited by the president for its new historic England-Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt plants at Regensburg, Germany, in August, 1943, Sergeant Locklear also holds the air medal and three oak leaf clusters for "meritorious achievement" during bombing attacks on Nazi war-making installations.

Flying Radio Man Promoted to Corporal

AAF COMMAND STATION, ENGLAND—Albert "Sam" Mock of Eugene, a flying radio operator, recently was promoted to the grade of corporal. Assigned to the ferry and transport wing of the air service command, Corporal Mock has been flying regularly since October 1943, when he arrived overseas in England. He has logged several hundred hours of flying time and wears the silver wings of an air crew member.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Mock. Before entering the army air forces in September, 1942, he was associated with E. A. Mock and Sons, used cars dealers.

Corporal Mock began his army training at the Oakland, Calif., trade school. He later moved to Sioux Falls, S. D., where he attended the air force radio school. He qualified as a radio operator there, but it was not until he came overseas that he began flying.

The squadron to which Mock is assigned ferries new fighters and bombers to combat bases, and operates a military airline for the delivery of high-priority passengers, mail and cargo throughout the United Kingdom and France.

Dr. Wilson Compton New WSC President

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Dr. Wilson Martindale Compton, secretary and manager of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association and member of one of America's most notable families, today announced his acceptance of the presidency of Washington State college at Pullman, Wash.

Dr. Compton will succeed Dr. Ernest O. Holland, retiring after a tenure of more than 30 years. It was not announced when the new president will assume his duties.

An attorney and economist, Dr. Compton has been active in the fields of timber and forestry, agriculture, and political science since his graduation in 1911 from the College of Wooster at Wooster, O., where his father, the late Dean Elias Compton, was a professor of philosophy for more than 50 years.

Brothers In Education

Dr. Compton's mother, Otella Catherine Compton, was chosen the "American Mother" for 1939 by the Mother's Day foundation. One of Dr. Compton's two brothers, Dr. Karl Taylor Compton, is president of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and the other, Dr. Arthur Holly Compton, is a University of Chicago physicist and holder of the Nobel prize for cosmic ray research. His sister, Mary, is the wife of Dr. Charles Herbert Rice, president of the Forman Christian college, Lahore, India.

Dr. Compton said he looked forward with great interest to his new post.

"The firm foundation of the Pacific northwest's fundamental resources, the development of new fields of industry, agriculture and forestry, and the opening of new gateways to Alaska and the Orient mean that this area is destined to have an increasingly vital role in our nation's future," he said. "I am glad to have the opportunity to contribute to its achievement."

Dr. Compton, who observed his 54th birthday yesterday, graduated with honors from the college of Wooster where he was a four-sport athlete, participating in football, basketball, and tennis. He later studied for an advanced degree in economics in the university of Cincinnati and from 1912 to 1915 was a fellow in the department of history, politics and economics in Princeton university where he received his Ph. D. degree.

Economics Instructor

Dr. Compton was an economics instructor at Dartmouth college in 1915 and during World War I was attached to various government war agencies. He became head of the infant National Lumber Manufacturers' association after the war, a post he resigns to go to Pullman. He developed the group until in 1937 it won the American Trade association executives' award for excellence and achievement as an industry association.

He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Alpha Tau Omega fraternities and is a governor of the International Forestry commission and a fellow of the Royal Economic society of Great Britain.

For many years he has been the executive vice president of American Forest Products Industries, Inc., and president of the Timber Engineering company.

Enner Resigns As Aide In Portland Bureau

Announcement has been made by Herman Kehrli, director of the bureau of municipal research and service at the University of Oregon, of the resignation Oct. 15 of Howard R. Enner as assistant director in charge of the Portland branch of the bureau of municipal research.

Enner has accepted a position with the Bonneville administration. He served in the bureau as acting director from October, 1942, to August, 1943, while Kehrli was in Washington, D. C., with the bureau of the budget.

statement; the kids were really superb. Several were six or younger, and the great majority were in the nine to 12 bracket.

Even the big boys and girls 17 looked pretty small on those big horses. Princess Nadine took a spectacular "pinwheel" fall off a big calf. Robert Lay, in the bucking contest, was all over his horse like a Cossack trick rider.

The horses seemed to buck with exceptional speed and power; circumstances gave them a big advantage over the riders—first, the riders weighed very little, and their legs were too short to grasp the buckers as an adult could have done. Second, they wore no saddles, no belly bands, and no halters. The riders had nothing to hold on to except a surcingle or the horse's mane. . . . a good idea to bring the bucking stock and calves past the grandstands to run them into the chutes—adds color to the show.

It was as neat a piece of maneuvering by a calf-roping team as this writer has ever seen at the Pacific International or any other big show, when Verle Baarstad and his self-owned and self-trained horse, Beauty, tackled a big calf. The calf had nearly fought through the loop when the black pony, watching and playing his calf at the end of a taut rope, made a sudden leap backward, drawing the loop tight around the calf's hind feet and throwing it hard.

The rider was on the ground and nothing but the pony's own horse-sense impelled him to do the trick. They say a good rope horse is next to human—that horse must be. But many boys lost their roping chance when their horses lagged behind the calf, or pulled him-headed behind like falling to lead the calf on the turn. Most of the kids rode with little help. Only a marvelous sense of balance kept them up there.

If the show is held again next year, and of course it will be, it should be done in exactly the same way, same routine, same personnel managing, same marvelous barbecue, same Saturday night bonfire party for kids, same financial arrangement which removes all suspicion of professionalism or dishonesty.

Only one thing should be different—the date. Such a bang-up entertainment deserves a July or August week-end—although the weather this time just happened to be perfect. But it might not happen again for years in October.

And only one criticism can be made. Children should remember that no matter how dusty they get by the end of the day, they should start out with everything clean—all leather should be wiped down with saddle soap, all bits and buckles and metal ornaments polished, saddle blankets particularly freshly washed, and horses should be cuffed and blanketed, and manes and tails combed and brushed. It's like this, kids—your mother makes sure that you are washed behind the ears. You must do the same for your horse. (Adult rodeo performers please copy).

Traffic Fatalities In State Decrease

Traffic fatalities in Oregon during the month of September totaled 18, a decrease of 28 per cent from the toll of 25 deaths in the same month of 1943. Secretary of State Bob Farrell announced today. This is the lowest traffic fatality toll for the month of September since the year 1933 when the month had 16 fatalities, Farrell said.

Here are the fatality tolls for the month of September since accurate records have been kept:

Of the 18 persons killed in traffic in September, four, or 22 per cent, were pedestrians. This is a reduction from the toll of six pedestrians killed in September of 1943 which was 24 per cent of the total fatality toll. There were two bicycle deaths this month, compared to one a year ago.

Only two deaths resulted from collisions between motor vehicles this September. A year ago, there were 11 fatalities involving collisions between motor vehicles, or 44 per cent of the total death toll. There were 5 deaths from non-collision accidents this September and four from vehicle collisions with fixed objects.

Since speed too great for existing conditions usually is a prime factor in non-collision accidents, while failure to yield right of way or driving on the wrong side of the road are the prime factors in collision accidents, Farrell declared the fatality toll for this September indicated a need for more drivers to watch their speed on rural highways. Speed checks maintained by the traffic engineering division of the state highway department on the Pacific highway indicated only 16 per cent of the drivers using this highway in September held their speed below the 35 mile wartime speed limit.

"With vehicles and equipment getting older and with tire replacements uncertain, it is important that drivers hold their speeds down as a conservation measure as well as a safety measure," Farrell declared.

from Le Thillot, some 30 miles above Belfort, to the Marne-Rhin canal near Lunerville.

Patel's American 7th army stormed the ancient fort of Manonville and captured Embermenil, 10 miles east of Lunerville. Some 13 miles southeast of Lunerville, other American troops captured Glonville and Fontenoy, threatening the highway hub of Baccarat guarding the Saverne gap and Dorn pass routes to Strasbourg.

More Towns Seized

Another column farther south seized Roville, four miles north of Rambervillers. Fremontfaine, six miles south, and several other villages, but the Germans still were defending their Mortagne river line and threw armor into a woodland battle between Brouvelles and Bruyeres.

At the northern end of the front, British 2nd army patrols in the Netherlands thrust across the lower Rhine river for the first time since the Red Devil paratroops made their abortive attack on Arnhem three weeks ago.

Southeast of Arnhem, British forces crossed the Millerbeek river and advanced to within a mile and a half of Vemay, three miles below Overloon, and also captured Smakt, due east of Overloon.

The Canadian 1st army linked up its bridgehead south of the Schelde river and north of the Leopold canal in southwestern Holland.

Sen. Harry S. Truman, President Roosevelt's running mate on the democratic ticket, scheduled a major speech for today (Monday) at 7:30 p. m., PWT at Los Angeles. John W. Bricker, running mate with Dewey, arranged California speeches in Santa Barbara, Ventura, Glendale and San Bernardino today.

And, yet to little more than three weeks yet to go before the election, there were these other campaign highlights:

The New York Times, saying that on the issue of foreign policy, "We believe that the scales tip heavily in favor of the democratic party," announced its support of Roosevelt's re-election. The Times supported him in 1932 and 1936, but was for Wendell L. Willkie in 1940. The Chattanooga Times, which supported Willkie four years ago, announced its support of Roosevelt for a fourth term. The Dallas, Tex., Morning News, an independent democratic paper, came out editorially for Dewey.

So did the Hartford, Conn. Times, also an independent democratic paper, saying it favored Dewey's position on the establishment of a post-war peace organization, it added that support of republican senators for such an organization "possibly can be more certainly commanded under leadership of a republican president."

Gov. Dewey, replying to an analysis of his campaign speeches released through the white house, said "This statement confesses
