A commando who has partici-

with the British Forces."

Major Ashton entered the war
as a captain in the royal artillery
but was transferred to the com-
mandos. He participated in the
Algeria landing, the Tunisian
campaign, and the Sicily landing.
In 1943 he was promoted to
major. He served on SEAC staff
as naval bombardment adviser to
Lord Mountbatten until February,
1944, when he returned to Eng-
land to assist with preparations
for D-Day. He went ashore with
an American unit on D-Day.

Major Ashton intended to be
a doctor but now he is a pro-
fessional soldier and will remain
such.

FDR Stresses Big
Goal Of Peace Plan

WASHINGTON, —(AP)— Presi-
dent Roosevelt said Tuesday he
was getting terribly fed up with
some people who, he declared, are
trying to stir up dissensions over
the proposed world security or-
ganization by talking about minor
details instead of the general
objectives.

He declared emphatically at a
news conference that the people,
too, would be fed up when he
begins to talk about this subject.
He indicated he might do so in
his speech in New York Saturday
night before the Foreign Policy
association.

Roosevelt made his remarks
after a reporter asked whether
he thought this nation's delegate
to the proposed peace council
should have to refer to congress
on each incident that comes be-
fore the organization.

There's an awful lot of people
who want to talk about whether
the delegates should wear silk
hats or low-necked dresses, the
president replied, and asked what
that has to do with the broad
objective of a world peace plan.

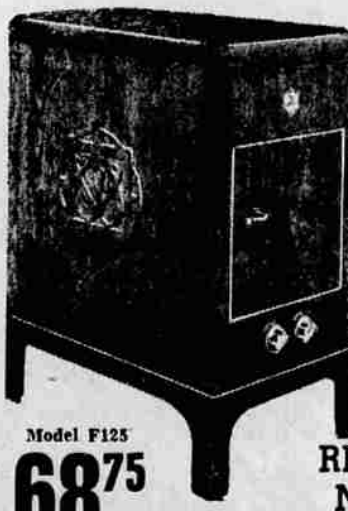
Roosevelt said he didn't think
this country ought to get into
discussions of such details as
where each delegate is going to
live or where he is going to
breakfast—that the main thing is
the grand objective.

We are after a great objective,
he added, and shouldn't be didac-
tic on details.

The president said he did not
believe Washington would be a
good site for the permanent seat
of the world organization and said
it might be a good idea not to
have any central meeting place
except for an office building to
keep the peace organization's
records.

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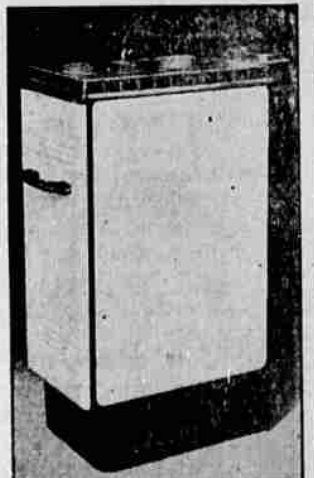
