

Home Extension Committee Meets

Lane county home extension committee held its regular meeting Oct. 16 at the Butte park cottage. Present were Mrs. John A. Drew, chairman; Mrs. Dan A. Drew, secretary; Mrs. Jule L. Korn, treasurer; Mrs. Kenneth McCormack

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and Miss Nellie C. Lyle, home demonstration agent.

Chairmen of the 16 home extension units in the county will be asked to appoint a chairman for associated country women of the world, it was decided by the county committee members. Mrs. O. A. Drew is county chairman for the ACWW, purpose of which is to promote peace through better understanding among home-makers in many countries.

Further plans for the landscaping meetings scheduled for January, February and March were made. It was decided that the Alvarado, Irving and North Lane home extension units would meet on Feb. 16 at the home of Mrs. L. Zumwalt for this project, with Kenneth Johnston as speaker. Johnston will also discuss landscaping and gardening problems with the Jasper, Lost Valley and Fall Creek units meeting together on March 1. The first home extension units scheduled for the landscaping project are the North Fork and Siltcoos groups. Their date is to be Jan. 18 and E. A. Danielson, county club agent, will give the demonstration. Plans for the other unit meetings on landscaping are not yet completed.

Time of day for the home demonstration agent's radio broadcast was discussed. Members of the county committee unanimously agreed that a time later in the morning would be preferable to the time of the present extension program, 6:45 a.m. on Mondays. A new program time will be secured if possible.
