

Rotary District Head Visits Local Club

The purposes and functions of Rotary organizations were topic for a talk given to the local club, Tuesday, by William Shannon, Seattle, district governor, Dist. No. 101. In this district, which covers an area of more than one million square miles, Shannon as district governor will call on 95 clubs, representing a membership of 6,000, the district being the largest within Rotary International. Shannon stopped here en route to Grants Pass to pay an official visit to the club there.

His talk here centered around the four major departments of Rotary, or "Rotary pillars," as Shannon termed them. First, there is club service, including the factors of attendance, fellowship, participation in club programs, club activities and committees, all these factors making the club function. Secondly, he discussed the objective of community service, saying to have a Rotary club made up of community leaders is

not enough, each Rotary club must be an organization doing something for its community. Vocational service, the third objective, he termed nothing more or less than practice of the Golden Rule. The fourth function is international service, and Shannon told the local group that due to the shrinking world, with quickened transportation placing any point in the world within 48 hours away from us, and newer and greater inventions coming on, "whether we like it or not, we are going to have to learn something about our neighbors," we must awaken to understand other peoples of the world, because today the whole world is our neighbor.

D. McVoy, technician of the Portland city plan commission, is expected to be in Eugene the latter part of the week.

Commission Criticized
The packed meeting room heard Robert Prescott, chairman of the city plan commission, present a minority report, opposing that body's majority-approved suggestion that the streets be vacated, which action has been sought by the city school board. Prescott averred that the plan commission has "either surrendered or passed the buck" under political pressure.

He declared that in the city's master street and zoning plan, High street was set aside for a major arterial from the district south of the city to the business district. If it is closed, he order that the city schools may alter their building program there, it will be like blocking a main artery in the human body, Prescott declared.

The minority report, also signed by Miss Mozelle Hair, pleaded that, on a basis of the future development of Eugene, in consideration of major highways which will need connecting arterials to the city center, and for the good of future residents of the area between Spencer Butte and the city, vacation of the streets be prevented. "There can be no scientific zoning without a scientific arterials program," Prescott said.

Proponents of the closure proceedings argue that the area will be better residentially if its streets are not made major thoroughfares. State highway engineers have disavowed intention of making any of the affected streets arterials to highways skirting the city on the south, and have suggested an alternate route. Their closure has been part of the improvements plan of the city schools, in conjunction with the University of Oregon.

Annexation Opposed
Two petitions, one bearing 109 signatures, and one signatures of 24 property owners, stated opposition to the Chambers-Westmoreland annexation plan.

The former declared that the signers, residents in the affected area, planned to install their own sewage disposal and water systems after the war, in answer to criticism of the health menace presented by improper disposal of sewage in the district.

Roy Crow said that residents there would have bought land in the city had they wished to be a part of Eugene. "How can the city say it will take care of our sewage when residents within its incorporated limits have to build septic tanks," he wanted to know.

Crow referred to lands in the Amazon district where the natural slant makes it necessary that all the sewage be pumped up to level of the city system.

Mayor Elisha Large pointed out that the city has made financial arrangements to care for the problem as soon as materials are available.

Jack E. Brindle declared that the area's residents were being "railroaded" into something that was against the wishes of many. He asked that the area be divided before a vote was made.

Strong Sentiment Denied
The opposition also leveled criticism against Jess Hayden, acting chairman of the group favoring annexation, who had reported at the last meeting of the council that he had found a preponderant sentiment in favor of the move.

One resident said no member of the opposition had been included in the group which drew up the area's boundaries. Representatives of the industrial group wondered why businesses north of the Oregon Electric tracks had not been included as well as those south.

J. E. Leach asked for a change in the boundary line to eliminate some 12 acres of his property, which he described as farm land, purely and simply.

E. C. Sawyer of the Sawyer Machine Works reiterated his request that the boundary be drawn on a line of the alley between Seventh and Eighth Avenues west, for a new northern border.

Menace Is Claimed
W. J. Cloyes, county sanitarian, repeated his findings that the lack of adequate sewage disposal in the Chambers-Westmoreland area was a menace to the entire city of Eugene.

The plan's advocates, speaking against dividing the district for the special elections, said there was danger that the opposing areas would benefit at the expense of the others.

Permission was granted to the Women of the Moose, represented by Mrs. C. O. Bartel, graduate regent, to take over the city government on Friday, which is Navy day.

Council accepted the resignation of Col. James H. Tierney from the fair rent committee, and confirmed Mayor Elisha Large's appointment of M. H. Stewart as his successor.

A new airport lease, submitted to the city by United Airlines company, was approved. The new arrangement, according to C. A. Eberhardt, airport manager, will increase the amount of land under the lease, and will add \$4.91 to the monthly rental, making a total rent of \$54.91 per month, \$558.92 per year.

Eberhardt said that the company had reason to expect expansion in the future, and that the west is the logical direction for such expansion. For that reason, the mortgage on the north is being increased, he said.

Technical description of the property now under lease to the air line follows:
"Beginning at a point 20 feet north, 1711.693 feet west of the southeast corner of section 6, T. 17 south, R. 4W., W.M., running thence west 364.307 feet, then north 387.0 feet, thence east 271.5 feet, thence south 86.5 feet, then east 92.807 feet, then south 300.5 feet to point of beginning and containing 132,959 square feet."

on German air power in 1937. Engel said that "while President Roosevelt had insisted warnings of grave potentialities of German war strength," he held down requests for military appropriations "and now blames congress."

'Way To Victory'
The argument that once "war starts they do not wait for a new commander-in-chief to learn something of his duties" was advanced by Postmaster General Walker. He told a Cleveland party rally that Roosevelt knows the way to victory and a lasting peace.

But from Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio, No. 2 man on the republican ticket, came assertions that the president follows a "consistent pattern of contradictions." It will be a relief for the people, Bricker said at Denver, "to listen to a man who does not talk in terms of expediency."

Another home front dispute started when Republican Chairman Brownell said in a statement at New York that Sen. Truman "gave his blessing to Hal Styles, whose admission that he was formerly a leader of the Ku Klux Klan, has been printed extensively in California newspapers."

Improvements For Umpqua Bar Okayed

REEDSPORT—Rehabilitation of the seaward end of the south jetty and repairs to the landward end, to prevent sea breakthrough, also dredging of the channel by hopper dredge, have been authorized by the war department, Sen. Guy Cordon has advised commissioners of the Port of Umpqua.

These improvements to the Umpqua bar during the present fiscal year, announced to Senator Cordon by the army engineers, will be followed by consideration of auxiliary works if they do not produce channel dimensions and necessary depth, Cordon stated.

It is the view of the army engineers that it is necessary to make the repairs above and then observe results, in order to determine the best type of auxiliary works for future construction.

Senator Cordon quoted from a letter just received from the war department, as follows: "You may be sure that the department appreciates the desire of local interests for the maintenance of a suitable channel to serve the Port of Umpqua, and should the need arise for the construction of auxiliary works to assist in maintaining the project channel, the department will take appropriate action in this regard."

Senator Cordon further stated that he will, of course, continue his efforts in the matter.

From Cordon's telegram, and from the information received from the war department, it appears to the commissioners of the Port of Umpqua that prospects for maintaining the requisite channel depth over the bar are brighter than for several years, they state. From the information just received, the war department seems committed to do whatever work may be necessary in order to secure a safe harbor entrance.

Last Of "Off Highway" Gas Coupons To Expire

Last of the non-serially numbered off-highway gasoline coupons, those lettered "E" and "R" will expire Oct. 31. E. W. Eggen, district OPA mileage rationing representative, advised farmers and other non-highway gasoline users this week.

Such coupons which are not serially numbered and which were issued for use before Nov. 1, may be exchanged for valid ration currency at local boards by non-highway users, Eggen explained.

Expiring coupons may be identified by two points: they do not have a serial number on them, and they bear the capital letter "E" or "R" with no number after it. (Currently valid coupons, in addition to bearing serial numbers, are lettered "E-1," "E-2," "R-1," and "R-2.")

Filling station operators have through Nov. 10 to turn in the expired coupons to their gasoline suppliers, or to exchange them at their local board for ration banking checks, OPA revealed. It also announced that distributors will have through Nov. 20 to deposit these coupons in their ration bank accounts.

World Prosperity Key To Peace, Says Cordon

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 24 (U.P.)—World prosperity is the key to a lasting peace, United States Sen. Guy Cordon of Roseburg declared in an address here Monday night.

"We must create a sound, productive prosperity in this country so we can aid by example and by interchange of goods the creation of a like material prosperity in other countries, thus doing away with the underlying cause of war—the despair and fear that comes from abject poverty," Cordon said.

Cordon, who was appointed to succeed the late Sen. Chas. L. McNary, is candidate on the republican ticket for re-election.

A leave of absence for the remainder of the year was granted to Miss Frances Elizabeth Baker due to ill health, it was also announced.

Fourth Term Issue Fading, Says First Lady

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (U.P.)—The fourth term is less of an issue in the 1944 presidential campaign than the third term was four years ago, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt told a press conference today.

She said there are three major campaign issues this year, all of them "tied together"—how to provide jobs for all after the war, winning the war, and building foundations for peace in the future.
