At Baptist Rally

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Former Eugene Druggist
Dies In Cleveland, Ohio

Harry Weider, a Eugene resi-
dent for many years, prior to
about 1915, died at Cleveland,
Ohio, Oct. 11, according to word
received by relatives here. He
was aged about 78 years.

Mr. Weider was a druggist by
profession and was employed at
different drug stores in Eugene,
later operating a photograph
studio here.

From Eugene he went to Port-
land, thence to Idaho and later
to California, then went east to
Cleveland where his son, Bryton
Weider, lives. Mrs. Minnie Fur-
man and Flora Morris, both of
Eugene, are his nieces.

Validation Dates For
Ration Stamps Given

Validation dates for five more
blue stamps for processed foods
and four more red stamps for
meats-fats were announced to-
day by OPA. Each of the stamps
will be worth 10 points.

On Sunday, Oct. 29, red stamps
L5, M5, N5, and P5 will be good
for meats-fats a total of 40 points.
Consumers are reminded that the
four red stamps will have to last
them for a 5-week period. It is
expected that the next red stamps
will not be validated until Dec.
3.

On Wednesday, Nov. 1, blue
stamps S5, T5, U5, V5 and W5
will become valid for processed
foods a total of 50 points. These
stamps will have to last a month.
Under the present system, five
blue stamps are validated on the
first of each calendar month.
All stamps to be validated will
be good indefinitely.

Expenses For Senate
Campaigns Reported

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—(P)—
The \$15,465.28 spent by Cameron
Sherwood, Walla Walla republi-
can, in his unsuccessful bid for
his party's senatorial nomination,
was the top personal expenditure
reported by northwest senate as-
pirants in the primary campaign,
the senate campaign expenditures
committee has disclosed.

Guy Cordon, successful in his
bid for the Oregon GOP senator-
ial nomination, reported no per-
sonal outlay although \$23,785 was
expended by his campaign com-
mittee. Wayne L. Morse, also
successful in his republican bid,
listed \$932.73 with \$23,388.50
spent by his campaign committee,
while Sen. Rufus C. Holman, also
a republican, listed \$1,085.55 with
\$13,021 spent by his campaign
committee.

Frankie Wood, 65, wife of Silvy

Sunday in Salem. She was a
native Oregonian, born at Corval-
