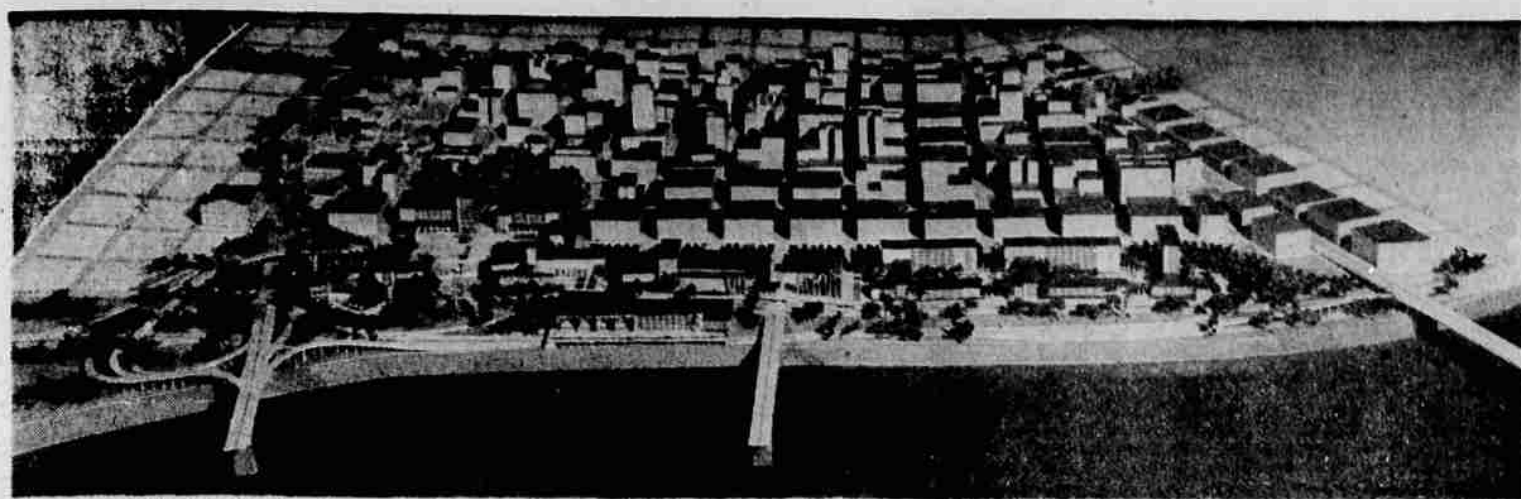

TO PROTECT BUSINESS CENTER of Portland from continued "erosion" of taxable values and trade volume, this design for a Civic Center has been prepared by Arthur McVoy, Portland's plan engineer, who spoke to three meetings here Thursday and Friday on the similar problems of the

Eugene-Springfield area. This picture is a photograph of a scale model of the Portland "downtown" — from the Willamette river to 10th street, from Burnside bridge to Hawthorne. It is proposed that the city of Portland shall acquire and clear several blocks back from the water front to provide — large OFF STREET

PARKING FACILITIES, plus a regrouping of federal, county, state and city buildings, all of which would be so constructed as to provide additional parking at ground level, and to open wide thoroughfares into the central district. On the Hawthorne bridge line an entirely new boulevard would be constructed in a cut, so that

intersecting streets would pass over it. No immediate change in Burnside is proposed but it might be made in the future. The main aim is to provide a plan of traffic management and parking to serve all who want to do business in the business center, to check the drift of business to sub-centers where easier traffic handling is possible. Estimated costs — for land, about \$5,000,000; for entire project about \$20,000,000 to be spread over long period of years. McVoy argues that unless cities fit themselves to handle modern traffic, they will lose out. The area shown here in Portland has suffered nearly \$30,000,000 depreciation of taxable values since 1930.

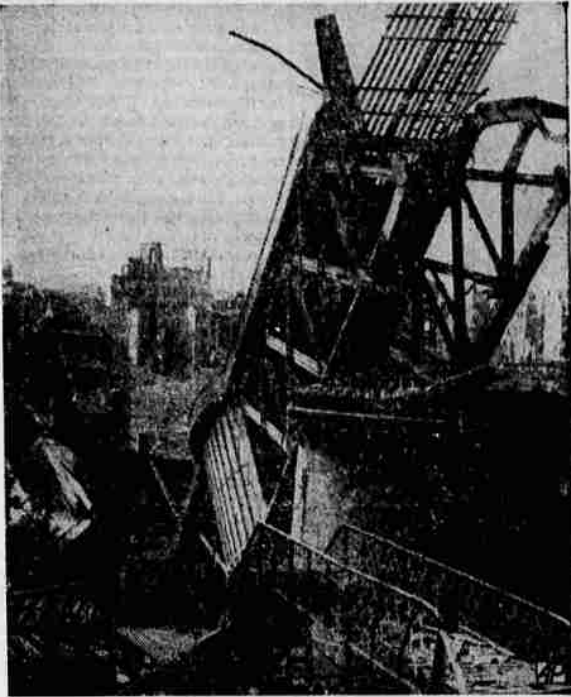

SOCIAL EVENING PLANNED

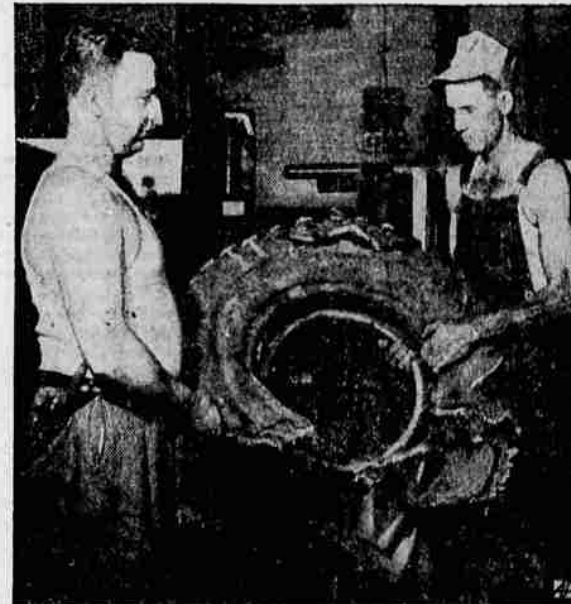

National Hearing Week Is Concluded

Eugene society for the Hard of Hearing joined with others throughout the nation in observance of National Hearing week, Oct. 22-28.

The occasion marked the 25th anniversary of the national organization, this being noted by President Roosevelt in a letter to Dr. Warren H. Gardner, Washington, D.C., president of the American Society for the Hard of Hearing, comprising 120 chapters.

Mrs. S. L. Peters, 717 Jefferson, is president of the Eugene society, other officers being: Mrs. F. L. Chambers, 1059 Hilyard, vice-president; Mrs. M. L. Wilder, 1471 Mill, secretary; Mrs. G. E. Heslep, 679 Lincoln, treasurer; Mrs. E. S. Fish, route 1, and Mrs. S. F. Martilla, directors.

The national organization chose the observance as the occasion to declare a program to aid children

who are hard of hearing, and who, unaware of detecting hearing, are bewildered, ridiculed by playmates and considered stupid, so that they develop inferiority complexes.

Special instruction in speech reading schools, special training in speech and voice, vocational guidance, and hearing equipment were advocated by the national society for the five to six per cent of school children with defective hearing.
