

Edw. F. Bailey Gives Statement For Fisk

Edward F. Bailey, who heads a committee working in support of Fred Fisk, democratic nominee for county judge, Saturday issued a statement in Fisk's behalf as follows:

"Many of my friends, as well as myself, urge the election of Fred Fisk to the office of county judge of Lane county solely on the basis of merit. His qualifications are superior and outstanding."

"He has been successful in his financial and business affairs and is a heavy taxpayer. He was one of the incorporators of the United

States National bank of Eugene and for some time was cashier and director of the same. He was in the timber business from 1912 to 1930 and at present is the owner of apartment houses in Eugene.

"He is a graduate of the University of Oregon and a former member and president of the board of regents of that institution. "He has had long and valuable experience in public life, having served two elective terms as sheriff of Lane county and one term in the state senate. He was elected county judge of Lane county in 1932 and served with distinction until 1938 when he was appointed to the federal office of collector of customs for Oregon where he served or a term of four years. He was succeeded in this position by Nan Wood Honeyman, former congresswoman from Portland and a life-long personal friend of President and Mrs. Roosevelt. He returned to Eugene in 1942.

"In every office which he held, Fred Fisk has proved himself a faithful and efficient public servant. He is an honest and capable administrator. He possesses judicial temperament and will make his decisions on probate, juvenile and other judicial matters presented to him fairly, and on the basis of merit only. He is noted for his courteous treatment of those who come in contact with him and the sympathetic attention which he gives to their problems.

"From a business standpoint Lane county may be likened to a 50 million dollar corporation. In the person of Fred Fisk, we have a man who is fully equipped by education, training and experience to lead in its successful management. He has the ability to meet and deal with the state highway commission, federal road agencies and other public agencies in such a manner as will entitle his views to respect and consideration. By the same token his experience and past record insures that he will deal with the many personal problems and human relationships which a county judge is required to consider and act upon in a fair, courteous and sympathetic manner.

Young Architect Has Fine Array of Model Ships

A 23-year-old boy whose childhood hobby and life work tie in together is Kenneth Lodewick, Portland senior at the University of Oregon.

When young Kenneth joined the sea scouts, he became so interested in ships and books on ships that he began building models and collecting books on the sea and boats. Now a student in architecture, Kenneth's study of draftsmanship has helped him to turn out 45 ship models, some of which are on display at the university library.

His library of 85 volumes contains many rare and out of print volumes that larger libraries would like to have.

Technical sea books are not in great demand and so have usually been put out in small editions, Kenneth says. He gets new ones as they come along but many of his choicest finds are the result of his voluminous correspondence with second hand book stores all over the country.

Accuracy is Kenneth's aim, but once in a while it does not pay, he has found. Not so long ago, Kenneth helped a friend make a model of a modern destroyer. They weren't satisfied with the details, so they took cameras and peeked over the sea wall in Portland and photographed a destroyer which had just come in. The pictures were fine and detailed, so Kenneth and his friend went to work. The finished ship model was displayed in downtown Portland and all the comments were encouraging except one. That came from the United States navy. The details were too good and the model destroyer had to go into hiding for the duration.

Some of Kenneth's work to be seen in the library exhibit includes: H. M. S. Bounty, a model of the boat Captain Bligh commanded at the time of the mutiny which was destroyed at Pitcairn Island by the mutineers; Sovereign of the Seas, a boat built by Donald McKay in East Boston in 1854, that was so large no one would buy it and McKay had to send it out himself; the Joseph Lane brigantine, part of the U. S. revenue service (now the coast guard) just after the establish-

ment of the service; the Mayflower; and the Xebec, a vessel belonging to the pirates of the Barbary coast.

Some of the models have taken as much as 500 hours to build, Kenneth reports. Clipper ships are his great love.

"My draftsmanship helps me to draw and to find ways to build," this young enthusiast, who has made something worthwhile out of a boyish hobby, says.
