United Orders 15 More Great Airliners for Post-War Use



Signing of a contract for 15,000, and that of the 300-mile-an-hour 300-mile-an-hour four-engine Douglas DC-6 airliners was announced today by United Air Lines, making a total of 50 four-engine planes costing a total of approximately \$25,000,000 which the company now has an order for postwar service.

United originally contracted for 15 Douglas DC-4's and 20 DC-6's at New York City on September 11. The price of the 240-mile-an-hour DC-4 is approximately \$400,-

one stop enroute. Non-stop Chicago-New York time with the DC-4 is expected to be less than 3 1/4 hours; two-stop Los Angeles-Seattle time, less than six hours. The five-mile-a-minute DC-6, to be delivered later, will be able to reduce these times still further, flying coast to coast with one stop in approximately 8 1/2 hours; Chicago-New York, non-stop, in 2 hours, 40 minutes; Los Angeles-Seattle, with two stops, in about five hours.

LYONS COMMISSIONED Lt. Wilmer Lyons, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. G. Lyons of route 2, Eugene, received his commission last month at graduation exercises held at the army air force training command school at Yale University, New Haven, Conn. A graduate of Eugene high school in 1938, he attended the University of Oregon for two and a half years, majoring in physical education, prior to his entrance into the army in August, 1943.
