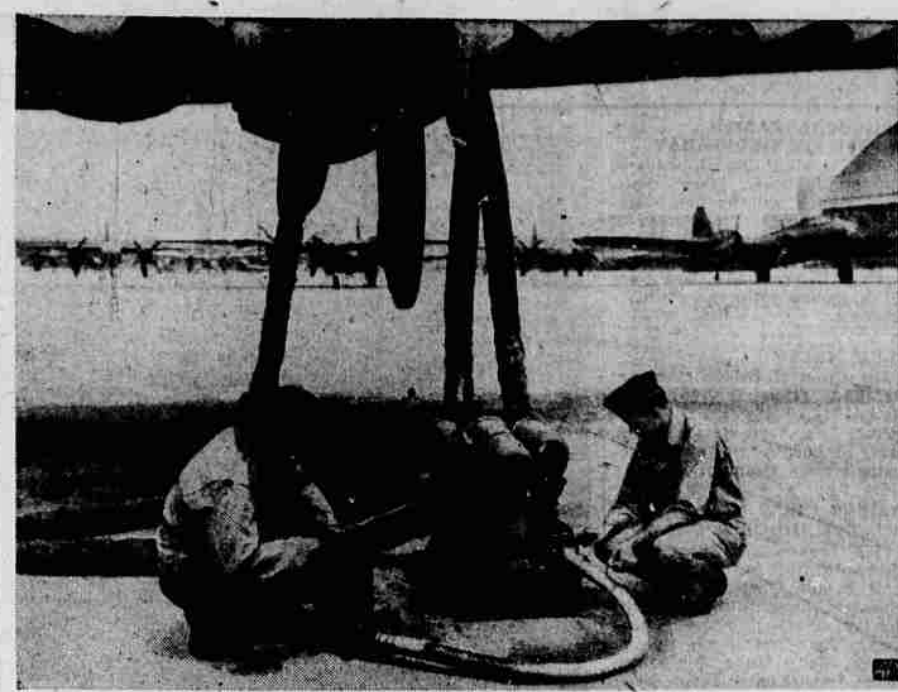
EVERYBODY'S DRUG

 hour demanded within two weeks.
Approval Announced
 A little more than one month ago it was announced, and published, that the war labor board had granted the raise, which was to go into effect within the short time necessary for the national board to approve the decision.
 The matter which particularly arouses the drivers, they say, is that they believe the public took this announcement as a final decision. As a matter of fact, they point out, there has been no raise in pay, and they are still working under conditions stipulated in their 1942 contract. The wage dispute arose at the time the 1943 contract was up for signature, and, consequently, it was never approved by the Oregon Motor Stages' management.
 Drivers at the meeting cited their long hours, the fact that they work at least 48 hours per week, and that no extra overtime pay is provided for in their contract. They said that the turnover of drivers in Eugene is large because their standard of living is low compared with that of men doing similar work in many other coastal cities.
 Another meeting later in the week has been scheduled, at which time methods of insuring a speedy settlement will be discussed.
