New Superintendent Of Sunset Home Here

In Eugene, ready to assume his post as the new superintendent of Sunset home, a self-supporting retreat for the aged and infirm, is Rev. A. N. Eggen, Lutheran pastor late of Everson, Wash., whence he came last week. Accompanying him to Eugene are Mrs. Eggen and their married daughter, Mrs. R. J. Rold and the latter's two sons. Mrs. Rold's husband is in the coastal service of the U. S. navy.

Rev. Eggen will take over his duties Nov. 1, but will be formally installed in the position later in the month. He succeeds Rev. H. J. Thorpe, who has been the home superintendent for the past seven years.
Coming to Sunset Home is for him a return to familiar things, as he was a member of the managerial board of the Sevenson Memorial Home association, owning corporation, for a period of eight years. At this time, he held a pastorate in Bend. He was active in the establishment of the present financial arrangements of the home. It is because his interest in the institution has remained undiminished in the seven years since he left Oregon for his Washington post, that he has returned, as he held an attractive place at Everson, he states.

His one regret in assuming his place as head of Sunset home, is that there is not twice the room afforded. Since he came, he has seen numerous elderly folk refused admittance because there are no accommodations.

It is Rev. Eggen's suggestion, that any Eugene families who might be able to give room to an old person, one able to pay reasonably for a home and protection, should leave their names at the office of Sunset home, where calls for such care are received daily.

The press of war has left many elderly people to depend upon themselves, he says, and it would be a patriotic gesture on the part of people of the community to give them shelter where possible.

Schmitz, Pianist, Comes Here Nov. 14

E. Robert Schmitz, noted pianist, will come to Eugene Nov. 14 for the second concert of the series of the Eugene Civic Music association, it was announced Tuesday by G. E. Gaylord, association president.

Schmitz replaces Leonard Pennario, pianist, who has been called overseas with the army air forces.

"Here is a case where the pinch-hitter easily may exceed the expectations built up for the previous artist," Gaylord said in commenting on Schmitz.

The concert will be given in McArthur court at 8:15 p.m. Nov. 14, the date being the same as for the Pennario concert, and the same type of program to be given in the substitute arrangement.

A recording artist of note, Schmitz has been acclaimed for his playing by many press reports. "An architect of tone," is the description given by the New York World-Telegram. "Schmitz is faultless at symphony concert," says the St. Louis Globe Democrat, while the Cincinnati Post refers to the musician as one who "charms with his artistic skill."

Federal Land Bank Declares Dividend

A 10 per cent dividend payable to all stockholders of record Sept. 30, 1944, has been declared by the federal land bank of Spokane, R. E. Brown, president, today advised James R. Brown, secretary-treasurer of the local national farm loan associations at Eugene. The stockholders consist of national farm loan associations, with the exception of a few borrowers who have obtained loans direct from the bank, the secretary-treasurer said.

mates \$400,000, is the first declared by the bank in more than a decade. The cooperative function of the institution to return savings to its stockholders and reflects the improved financial condition of the bank made possible through sound operations and the general improvement in agricultural conditions.

The office at Eugene serves farmer-owned national farm loan associations in this district, and is one of 60 such offices serving cooperative associations in the long-term farm loan business in the four states of Montana, Idaho, Washington, and Oregon.
