Route F Corrects Eugene On Autumn Blooming Lilies

An explanation about "Easter lilies in the fall" is sent in by Mrs. Elmer Hansen, Walton.

Says Mrs. Hansen: "The Philippine lily which to all appearances is a beautiful Easter lily blooms ONLY in the fall. I have grown them for four years and this year they have had more than 70 blooms since in late September. Furthermore, they are easier to grow than onions. So please don't play up those fall blooming Easter lilies as Eugene grown specialties. They get six feet tall with 9 and 10 blooms per stalk out here on Route F."

Prank Explosion Injures Girl

State police officers are investigating the case of injury to a young girl in the River Road district Monday night, caused by the breaking of the window of a car in which she was riding. The window was broken by an explosion thought to have been that of a dynamite cap, alleged to have been thrown by a youth as a pre-Halloween prank.

Officers who were called on the case said that several other similar explosions were heard in that locality that night, but nobody else was injured. The girl who was struck by the broken glass suffered cuts on her face but the injury was not serious.

Several youths were seen in groups in the River Road section Monday night, but no explosions were heard or any groups seen by the officers Tuesday night.

State police were also told that Monday night all of the windows of a new house being built in the River Road district were cut out

with glass cutters. The officers expressed the belief that this may have been done by the same group of boys that were tossing the explosives about.
