The jury in the case of the state against Clinton Dennis, Jr., tried on a charge of uttering and publishing a forged check, returning a verdict of guilty Wednesday afternoon and he will be sentenced later.

Junior Chamber Hears Bend Report

Junior chamber of commerce chapters throughout Oregon will take active part in the formulation and prosecution of a program to assist with the rehabilitation of returning service men, Maurey Jacobs, first vice-president of the state organization, told local members Wednesday night.

The program, which is being worked out on a national basis by the United States junior chamber of commerce, was discussed at length at last week-end's session of the state board of directors in Bend, Jacobs reported.

Another important state-wide project discussed at the session was post-war promotion of tourism in Oregon, Jacobs told the Eugene group.

Three new chapters, Grants Pass, Medford and Prineville have been formed and admitted in the state, Warren Whitlock, state vice-president in charge of expansion, told the board.

Lt. Gerald Briggs, who recently returned to the United States from a Romanian prison camp, addressed the local group at Wednesday night's meeting, and told as much of his experiences as censorship laws permitted. Lt. Briggs was one of 1250 allied prisoners released when Romania capitulated.

The junior chamber went on record as 100 per cent behind Merle Nash, recently announced chairman of the sixth war loan drive here.

Other members of the local chapter who attended the Bend meeting were Merle Nash, Kenneth Geiger, Lloyd Bissel, Mervin Dahl and Ralph Newman, all of whom agreed they "had never seen anything to compare with Bend's hospitality."

Illegal Registration Common In Seattle

SEATTLE, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Sheriff Harlan S. Callahan asserted today he had evidence of widespread illegal registration of voters in King county.

The evidence was gathered by his staff and by the Burns Detective agency, which was retained by a private individual, he said. The investigation is still under way and he plans to place a large staff of special deputies at the polls next Tuesday to challenge questionable voters.

October Building Permits Decrease

A sharp decline appeared in building permits issued for the month of October as compared with September of this year, was revealed Thursday. Permits for only \$28,983.44 were issued in October, whereas \$64,938.87 was invested in construction and repairs in September.

Break-down of the totals for each month revealed that the greatest decrease occurred in permits issued for new construction. Permit funds in September amounted to \$47,450, but fell to \$14,175 in October. Not as great a decrease was noted in the comparison of September's \$16,488.87 for repair permits with the \$12,788.44 of October.

October permits for 1944 nevertheless showed an increase over that month of last year, with \$26,968.44 against \$10,349 in October, 1943.

FDR Will Cut Steel Wage, CIO Man Says

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(AP)—A confident prediction came from CIO Counsel Lee Pressman today that President Roosevelt will take the lid off wages even before victory in Europe is in sight.

The lawyer who presented the steelworkers' case before the war labor board for a general increase which would puncture the administration's wage ceilings, also ventured the opinion that the board will dispose of corollary issues of vacations, guaranteed annual wages, etc., this month.

Some of the board members are believed to favor continuance of the present wage controls until V-E day or at least until victory over Germany can be foreseen.

But Pressman told reporters he is sure the little steel formula, keystone of the wage policy, will be breached by Mr. Roosevelt before that time.

POTATO CROP RECORD
KLAMATH FALLS, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Klamath Basin yielded more than 12,000 cars of potatoes, worth \$10,000,000 or more in the season just ended, C. A. Henderson, county agent, said today. This is a record-breaking crop.

Lack Of Walnut Pickers Serious

Lane county walnut growers are facing a serious problem at the present time on account of lack of pickers. Many growers report that 50 per cent of their crop is still to be harvested and the farmer labor office in Eugene is unable to fill

the orders for pickers. Rain and wind the past few days have caused the nuts to fall from the trees and a large part of the crop is now on the ground.

Most of the growers furnish transportation. Anyone who wants to engage in this work is asked to report at the farm labor office at 979 Olive street at 7:45 a. m. or telephone 1831 for information if they have their own transportation.
