

Greatest Air Victory Tallied

LONDON, Nov. 3. — (AP) — A thousand British heavy bombers laid about 4,480 tons of explosives and fire bombs last night on Germany's greatest arsenal of German aircraft after a day in which U. S. fighters of the 8th air force won "their greatest victory of the war over the Luftwaffe."

A special communiqué from U. S. strategic air force headquarters gave this description today and told of the destruction of 208 German aircraft over the synthetic oil center of Merseburg. It scaled down American losses to 40 heavy bombers and 19 fighters. One bomber and nine fighters, previously listed as lost in yesterday's operations, landed safely at French bases. The communiqué said "still others probably landed behind our lines in Europe" and were unable to report immediately.

Lt. William J. Cullerton of Chicago, led the aerial parade with eight destroyed, two in the air and six on the ground. Maj. John L. Elder Jr., Ebensburg, Pa., got one in the air and five on the ground.

Domburg in the swift rush over the island of Walcheren, last barrier to the free allied use of the port of Antwerp after the last German resistance was crushed in the pocket across the Scheldt estuary.

British empire forces were swarming through Walcheren from the east, south and west, and a junction which will mean the end of the last effective German resistance on the island appeared near.

The fall of Schmidt, 15 1/2 miles southeast of Aachen on the Monschau-Duren highway, represented the 1st army's deepest penetration of Germany. The town lies 10 miles inside the frontier in the Rotgen area.

French-American troops of Lt. Gen. Alexander M. Patch's 7th army southeast of Nancy captured the road and railway junction of Baccarat, a town of 5,000, athwart the approaches to the Salles, Ste. Marie and Bon Hommes passes through the Vosges mountains. A half dozen additional villages on an arc two miles north to five miles southwest of Baccarat also were seized.

American and British troops in southwest Holland drove back across the Mark river north of Oudenbosch and about six miles south of the Holland Deep and seized two new bridgeheads after German counterattacks had wiped out their earlier footholds.

Other British forces widened their hold on the south bank of the Maas river.

ness which it is called upon to perform in both the civil and criminal departments. Yet the sheriff has but one deputy whose full time can be devoted to criminal investigations. We believe that the greatly increased volume of criminal business, when considered with the fact that the number of people and the value of the property within the county is rapidly increasing, would fully warrant the employment of at least two more properly trained criminal deputies. We find that the sheriff's office has no stenographer, and we believe that at least one stenographer is essential if proper records, reports, and investigations are to be maintained."

The grand jury visited the county jail Thursday afternoon and made several recommendations for minor improvements, first declaring that the jail appears to be clean, well kept and maintained. It was found that there is adequate segregation of different types of prisoners, both male and female, and juvenile and adult. The suggestions for improvement are better heating facilities to make them adequate for cold weather, and purchase of a new garbage can with a cover and perhaps the facilities for the storage and disposal of garbage could be made more sanitary, it was stated.

The grand jury report was filed through Foreman J. H. McKinley. Other members of the investigating body are A. J. Acheson, Mildred Baile, Seth Caldwell, Grace Faust, Ernest Pugh and Charles Snellstrom.

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ed Moscow reports that Russian forces were closing the gap between them and Budapest and reflected a fear that the capital itself might fall soon.

The Nazi radio said the defenders of Budapest had withdrawn to the area south of Bugyi, 14 miles below the capital. Soon thereafter a Budapest broadcast of the second act of a play was interrupted. A male announcer took over and said:

"False rumors are spreading. All human beings are made of flesh, blood and nerves. The war will be won by the people with the best nerves."

There was no news on Russian progress on other fronts but usual rumors were circulating in Moscow that announcements of important victories were being withheld for the November 7th celebration of the 27th anniversary of the Russian revolution.

To the north military operations were being affected increasingly by the descent of early winter.

Rodman Denounces New Deal Dishonesty

Making a plea for honesty in administration, James A. Rodman, Sr., chairman of the Lane county republican central committee, in a talk before the Pro America meeting Thursday evening said President Roosevelt all the time says the extraordinary powers granted during the war times will be discontinued with the peace, yet the Roosevelt henchmen and subordinates go on preaching and writing their own views that these extraordinary powers must be kept.

"Why can't they be honest?" Rodman asked. He said Roosevelt had made promise after promise each time he comes up for election, then none of the promises is fulfilled, and his brain-trust—Rexford Guy Tugwell, Ickes, Wallace, and others then write and talk about the things necessary to set up a socialist state; how free enterprise, private business, etc., and other things must go or be changed.

"Why isn't the administration honest, why does it say one thing and then let its officials do otherwise?" the speaker asked.

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Grand Jury Indicts Four; One Secret

The grand jury, Thursday afternoon, reported to circuit court four indictments, one of them secret, and one "not true bill." Two of the indictments were against Charles Ernest Montague Duncan, accused of taking and using an automobile without the owner's permission and grand larceny of a car. The car in question is owned by Clyde Keever.

Leo V. Scoville was indicted on a charge of possession of property, an electric chain hoist, belonging to Swift and company.

The "not true bill" was in the case of Bert Shearer, who was accused of being an accessory to the commission of a felony. He is the husband of Betty Shearer, who allegedly obtained thousands of dollars from Eugene women two years ago for the purchase of stock in a "quickie" moving picture concern. She was accused here of obtaining money under false pretenses and was later held by federal authorities on another charge.

Allen Here, Reports State Trend To GOP

The trend to republicanism in Oregon continues to be very encouraging, very optimistic, stated Niel R. Allen, Grants Pass, republican state central committee chairman, who was in Eugene over Thursday night and Friday on his tour of various counties to check on pre-election situations.

His statement was based on information obtained from eastern Oregon counties. Upon arrival here, however, Allen said the outlook continues to brighten following visits in southern Oregon counties and mid-Willamette sections.

In sizing up situations, Allen is getting information from agricultural districts and from counties with large industrial payrolls and says there is a significant development toward republicanism.

"We are going to win, and we are going to elect a solid republican delegation to congress, two senators and four congressmen," Allen said.

While here he conferred with James A. Rodman, Sr., Lane county republican central committee chairman; Kenneth Nielsen, secretary of the state republican central committee; Ben F. Dorris, active with veterans groups, and other republican leaders.

45 Lost As Ship Sunk In St. Lawrence

MANTANE, Que., Nov. 3. — (AP) — Forty-five merchant seamen were missing today after a British freighter sank in the St. Lawrence river near Mantane. With the cause of the sinking obscure, there was speculation that Nazi submarines had again penetrated the St. Lawrence.

The ship went down last night after two explosions.

Dewey came out of Pennsylvania with a prediction by Gov. Edward Martin that the republicans would carry that pivotal state. Rain? Yes, Indeed; Almost Two Inches

The rainfall goes from one extreme to the other in this area this fall. In the 24-hour period ending at 11:30 a. m. Friday, nearly two inches of precipitation were recorded at Eugene, 1.93 inches.

The deluge followed an exceptionally dry period here, only traces of rainfall being recorded now and then during the first 30 days of October.
