

Kaiser Yard's Administration Building Burns

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 6.—(UP)—Fire destroyed the administration building of the sprawling Kaiser Oregon Shipbuilding corporation today, causing damage estimated at \$600,000, injuring seven persons and burning an undetermined number of vital master plans for ships under construction.

Al Bauer, general superintendent of the yard—largest in the Portland-Vancouver area—said the blaze started in a rest room of the cafeteria section of the building which also houses the general offices and personnel departments. The fire spread quickly and two explosions sent columns of flame through the roof.

Inability of firemen to enter the building because of the intense heat hampered their work. The two-alarm fire brought 10 companies and two fireboats from the Portland fire department, plus two coast guard fireboats and auxiliary equipment from other areas, augmented by the large shipyard department.

All that remained of the building

an hour after the first alarm was two chimneys and two concrete vaults.

When the fire cooled sufficiently, Bauer said it was hoped that an examination of the two vaults would disclose some of the key plans used in the making of attack transports. Only occupants of the building when fire was discovered at 5:25 a.m. were 26 cafeteria employees, who were driven out by the flames, and a telephone operator, Margaret Loney. She disregarded the spreading flames to telephone for help, fire equipment, and notify officials of the yard, then jumped for her life from a second floor window. She suffered slight burns and an injured ankle in the leap.

Bauer did not say immediately what steps would be taken for rebuilding of the destroyed structure, but it was assumed that emergency construction would be ordered to get the executive departments back in operation.

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Ellsworth Speaks For Kiwanis Club

"Word pictures" of his trip early this fall with a delegation of fellow congressmen to England and the then battlefronts in France were given Kiwanis club, Monday noon, by Rep. Harris Ellsworth, congressman from Oregon's fourth district.

Ellsworth gave little highlights of his trip, telling first of the visit in London and to parliament, especially the house of commons—commenting particularly there on the power and influence of the house in the government of Great Britain.

Of the trip to France, Ellsworth said there one found the whole operation a series of "things that couldn't be done, according to German version," but which were done in quick and orderly style.

He commented in praise on the way these operations were handled and the way transportation was set up and supplies put to the front in record time.

Gen. Eisenhower, Ellsworth said, is one of the world's great men, the congressman adding that he made that statement in judging Eisenhower as a man and citizen on top of being a great commander. It is a great satisfaction to those of us at home to realize we have such a great commander as Eisenhower and such a staff as he has in leading the many Americans who are in Europe to fight, Ellsworth said.

The congressman was in Eugene only to give the talk, planning to return afterwards to his home at Roseburg. He had been invited weeks ago to appear before the club and give impressions of his trip to Europe.

The war labor board ordered the men back to work in compliance with labor's "no-strike" pledge during wartime, but the return was delayed for a number of days. Finally in temporary conciliation, the men were removed and the men went back to work, pending further arbitration.

In September, Blair, the appointed arbitrator who was approved by both parties to the dispute, conducted a one and one-half day hearing in the case. Rendering his decision, he said:

"In view of all the facts and testimony submitted by the parties, and especially the evidence offered by the head loader and head rigger and members of the cutting crew, the arbitrator holds that (B) is not a safe loading engineer."

The decision said further, in substance, that "while the situation growing out of (B)'s refusal to join the union must be considered," the true import of such refusal seemingly was to break "the thread of loyalty" binding the employees together; also that while no accidents had been charged against the employee (B) that fact might be due as much to the care of other employees, and to ignore the evidence that he was unsafe on such ground, would be in effect to require the misfortune of accident before any grievance could be filed.

State Vote—

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Falls, new deal democrat. Cordon now holds the office by appointment.

The state's four republican congressmen were favored for reelection, as their opponents are democrats who are little known.

State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott and Atty. Gen. George Neuner, both republicans, also are up for reelection.

The new legislature will be republican by a big margin, as republicans already have enough to assure a majority.

Among the nine ballot measures, the "little Townsend" bill—to pay \$80 pensions by levying a 3 to 5 per cent gross income tax—has caused the most controversy, the arguments being that it would bring prosperity, or ruin the state. The other most controversial measures would levy a 3 per cent sales tax, and make the state assume a greater share in the cost of education.
