

British Capture Forli In Italy

ROME, Nov. 10.—British troops have captured Forli, Po valley communications center 38 miles southeast of Bologna on the Bologna-Rimini highway, allied headquarters announced today.

Capture of the old fortress city, which has a population of approximately 65,000, was accomplished by a pincer movement. One force moved directly up the Rimini-Bologna highway, while the second advanced up a road from the airfield to the southeast, penetrating into the town.

In addition other 8th army troops have loosened nazi positions in the hills south and southwest of Forli. Approximately 250 prisoners were taken as the town fell.

Snipers were still active in Forli, but leading British troops pushed through the town and reached the ruins of the main bridge over the Montone river on the west. The Germans were holding the west bank of the Montone in strength.

The village of Sadurano in the hills between the Montone and Rabbi rivers was captured, and 8th army troops pushed on to positions east of Castrocaro, an enemy-held junction point six miles below Forli on the highway leading through Forli to Ravenna.

Civic Groups Back Depot Canteen

Representatives of Eugene organizations Friday noon unanimously voted to establish a service men's canteen at the Southern Pacific station here and appointed an executive committee to make up a budget and a special plan of action.

Action on the canteen proposition has simmered since early this year when the junior chamber of commerce started groundwork for its establishment. Plans now call for the set-up to be completed by Dec. 15, or as soon thereafter as possible.

The canteen, which will be under the nominal sponsorship of the Red Cross, with assistance from other civic, fraternal and labor organizations, will be organized to serve some refreshments to service men passing through either on troop trains or on regular schedules, and to help make them as comfortable as possible.

Army interested. Evidence that the army is interested in having the canteen here came this week in a telegram to Mrs. Cora Pirtle, executive secretary of the Lane county Red Cross chapter, from the ninth service command at Fort Douglas, Utah, asking what action was being taken on its establishment. Answering telegram will state that the project is under way, full steam ahead.

The executive committee in charge of arrangements and establishment of the canteen will be made up of Maurice Jacobs, of the junior chamber of commerce; Mrs. Pirtle; Mrs. C. A. Huntington, of the local USO chapter; Henry Peck, IWA (CIO) representative; and Harvey Hilton, commander of the Eugene American Legion post No. 3.

Present at the Friday meeting, besides those named on the executive committee, were Harry Aldrich, president of the Eugene chamber of commerce; H. V. Johnson, chairman of the Red Cross in Lane county; Ken Battleson, junior chamber of commerce; Ralph Kindler, Active club; A. F. Richards, Lane County War Industries, Inc.; Ralph Dean, Southern Pacific district agent; Roy Woodruff, Central Lane planning council; Olaf Houghum, of the Lane county war chest committee; Dr. A. O. Waller, USO; Ross Hall, junior chamber; William M. Tugman, Register-Guard managing editor.

Johnson read a letter from Red Cross headquarters indicating the requirements for setting up such a canteen. Hall reported on the Reno, Nev. plan for a similar canteen. Several possibilities are open to the local organization, and the executive committee is to consider all possibilities and to report on those which seem most likely.

Red Guns Roar On Two Fronts

MOSCOW, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Soviet military dispatches reported today that massed Russian artillery had opened a large scale bombardment on the East Prussian and Baltic fronts in an apparent prelude to a major offensive.

Semi-official reports that the red army's big guns had broken the lull on the northern front followed by a day published forecasts that Russia's winter offensive from the Baltic to the Danube was about to begin.

Riga dispatches indicated that the Russians already had launched a major assault against 30 German divisions pinned against the Baltic coast in Latvia.

At the opposite end of the front, the Russians had begun a new offensive from a 45-mile bridgehead on the western bank of the Tisza river, driving toward Budapest from the east, while other forces closed against the Hungarian capital from the south.

Dispatches said the soviets were advancing slowly over trouble-some terrain between the Danube and Tisza in the face of unusually heavy resistance. The German and Hungarian armies appeared to have been reinforced in an attempt to save Budapest.

Armored columns of Marshal Rodion Y. Malinovsky's 2nd Ukrainian army swept across the Tisza from Mezocsat to Kiskore, 59 miles east of Budapest, and drove 15 miles through stubborn German defenses to liberate more than 50 inhabited places.

The soviet information bureau disclosed that more than 100,000 enemy troops were killed and 42,180 captured from Oct. 6 to Nov. 6 by Malinovsky's forces which carried the Russian lines to the southern doorstep of Budapest and now were converging from the east.

Civilian Turkey Shortage Debated

Local agencies handling turkeys Friday disagreed with the statement of the Portland dealer quoted by Associated Press as predicting an absence of turkeys from most Oregon and Washington Thanksgiving dinner tables, unless the OPA is enjoined from enforcing its present regulations on turkey sales.

People will have their turkeys, the local dealers agreed. If they don't go through the normal channels, a black market is bound to spring up, they predicted.

C. W. Norton, the Portland dealer, said OPA rules prevent distributors from paying growers more than 38.2 cents per pound for turkeys for civilian consumption, as compared to 39.2 cents per pound for turkeys for the armed forces. Accordingly, growers won't sell to civilians at the lesser price.

Norton has filed an injunction suit against OPA and the case is pending in Federal Judge McCullough's court.

MOUNTAIN CLIMB

Fifteen students from the university climbed to the top of the Middle Sister last week. The 12-mile hike was part of a basic training jaunt in geology. Guiding the students was Dr. Warren D. Smith, head of the geology and geography department, who has made the trip about 25 times. After an 80 mile ride in the geology truck, the climb took the students eight hours up and back.

Two Eugene Firms Pay OPA Claims

Two Eugene firms settled OPA administrator's treble damage claims for overcharges above ceiling prices, Adams F. Joy, OPA enforcement attorney of the Portland district office, revealed Thursday.

The Alaska Junk company paid \$1323.63 to the United States treasury representing three times the overcharge on sales of plumbing fixtures and doors, Joy explained. The firm described the matter as purely a technicality.

Brenners Hardware firm paid \$49.93, or one and one-half times the overcharge on sales of five electric plates and 30 hot water tanks.

Both stores have signed a statement that they will abide by price ceilings on future sales.

Brazilian Speaker On Extension Card

The Oregon state system of higher education is wearing a little feather in its cap at the moment, Dr. Henry Stevens, assistant director of the general extension division, says.

Dr. Stevens was in Eugene this week completing arrangements for the Institute of Inter-American Affairs program which will open November 15, in various cities in the state.

The feather is the fact that Dr. Hermanes Tovaes de Sa, featured speaker of the institute this year, is coming to Oregon direct from Brazil. He was sent there by the federal co-ordinator of inter-American affairs office in Washington, D. C. to make a study of present conditions and relations between the two countries.

His first public reports of his findings will be given in Oregon, at The Dalles, Burns, Lakeview, Ashland, Roseburg and Albany, cities to receive the program this year, in the order of their appearance.

Wine Retailers Have Time To Sell Stocks

PORTLAND, (AP)—Passage of the Burke liquor bill gives Oregon's 1243 wine retailers possibly up to 30 days to dispose of stocks containing more than 14 per cent alcohol, the state liquor commission said here.

A meeting of dealers to discuss disposal of fortified wines now on hand will be called soon, a spokesman reported. The governor is required to proclaim the measure a law within 30 days after the election.

Marshfield's Name Changed To Coos Bay

CITY OF COOS BAY, Ore., Nov. 10.—(AP)—There is no longer a city of Marshfield in Oregon.

The voters of this 5,200 population coastal town approved a new charter rechristening it as City of Coos Bay—a title which they consider more aesthetic.

The decision comes almost a year after an attempt to create an expanded City of Coos Bay through merger of Marshfield and its twin city, North Bend, went down to defeat at the hands of North Bend voters.

Jus how soon the technical processes of switching over the name of this Coos county city would be completed was still uncertain today. The new charter becomes effective "as soon as approved by voters," but the bill also provided that present councilmen

were to remain in office until 1, 1947.

Councilmen said they solve the problem by reorganizing the end of this year. The new charter, besides the name change, sets up a council-manager form of government.
