

United's Food Staff Get Jump On Peace

Those engineers, stewardesses and dining service experts who are serving meals, trying out various buffet arrangements and otherwise bustling around a big wooden mock-up of an airplane at Chicago, aren't just "playing house." It's all business—and it is pointing the way to further refinements in airline food service for the post-war age of flight.

The crude, life-size airplane cabin model at one of United Air Lines' Chicago hangars isn't intended to look like the big four-engine Douglas DC-4 or DC-6 planes which United has on order for immediate service after the war. It does, however, have the same cabin dimensions and it serves as a valuable laboratory in which the company's engineering and passenger service experts can try out various ideas. Their studies, they say, already promise a wide range of improvements in the big business of serving meals aloft.

How big that business already is may be judged from the fact that United Air Lines is serving approximately 1,350,000 sky meals this year; that it owns and operates nine flight kitchens—at New York, Chicago, Omaha, Denver, Cheyenne, Salt Lake, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Portland; that, counting all the company's coast-to-coast and Pacific coast flights, an average of two and a half meals are being served aloft every minute, day and night.

United has on order 15 four-mile-a-minute Douglas DC-4's and 35 five-mile-a-minute DC-6's. While those planes will offer new opportunities for food service refinements because of their roominess and their provision of increased weight allowances for food service items, they also will present service problems. For example, they will be going so much faster that the speed of meal service will have to be stepped up and their greater length will call for more distance to be covered in delivering meals to passengers.

Inauguration Will Be Simple Affair

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, back at the white house for another four years as the nation's first lady, revealed that simplicity will be the keynote of her husband's fourth term inauguration on Jan. 20.

"Arrangements and functions for the second wartime inauguration will have to be somewhat different," she told a press conference. "The only large scale function scheduled for inauguration day is the traditional afternoon reception. Other features that usually mark the occasion will be eliminated."

Asked if she was glad the president was re-elected, Mrs. Roosevelt hesitated and then said: "Well—the next few years will be years of great opportunity and I suppose everyone should be glad of opportunity even though they may not be glad about responsibilities."

"The next four years will probably be the most difficult the world has ever been through. The war must be won, the peace made, and the world rebuilt. You couldn't have a more difficult task than that."

The election, she said, reaffirmed one's belief in democracy despite "scams of the bitterest and strangest issues having been raised." The injection of herself into the campaign, she said, "was one of the phonies" and not an issue on which a voter made his decision.

Emerald Mails Service Edition Saturday

A special servicemen's edition of the Oregon Daily Emerald, University of Oregon student newspaper, was issued Saturday. Special features depicting university life in wartime were included in the regular campus news items, as well as news of university alumni now in the service.

The special issue will be mailed to all former university students now stationed in the United States with the armed forces. Dorothy Davis, Klamath Falls, and Marilyn Davis, Everett, Wash., chairmen of the campus war board service men's committee, are in charge of mailing the issue to the alumni in the service.

WAVES Contingent Going To Hawaii

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—The first contingent of 200 Waves to be sent overseas will leave shortly for Hawaii, the navy announced, contingent of 200 waves to be sent soon to Alaska, Panama and Puerto Rico.

Capt. Mildred H. McAfee, WAVES commander, told a news conference the assignments were being made under the new WAVES overseas service law, signed by President Roosevelt, Sept. 27, and that ultimately 4,000 or more would be sent to Hawaii.

Waves going overseas must stay a minimum of 18 months, and Capt. McAfee said that may account for the fact that the navy has not been deluged with applications for overseas service from its 80,000 waves.
