

Axemen Ask No Favors in District 3 Grid Selection

Coach Hank Kuchera and his assistants are asking no favors—but an impressive record in a formidable schedule to their credit claim to District 3 championship recognition. The "Purple" will take the decision of the district committee of the district which is close to the record in its close season, but the record is more impressive than those amassed by six other contenders—Columbia Prep, Gresham, Clatsop, after defeating Oregon State and University (Eugene) in the first two games of the season.

Quikridges, Lowell To Meet Here Wednesday

The Quikridges Warriors will be invited to meet the eastern district team, Lane county "B" high school, at the Clatsop stadium on Wednesday afternoon when Coach Walton's veterans meet the Quikridges. Game time will be 1:30 o'clock. The winner will go the right way to meet Mapleton's undefeated team in a county championship game at the stadium Friday night. Mapleton won its sixth straight title as Coach Al Johnson's team defeated Triangle 23-12. Quikridges blasted the Devils, 35-13, on Oakridge Friday after leaving an early-season 7-0 decision to Coach Theron Borden's team. Jim Shank, inexperienced non-transfer halfback, scored four touchdowns for Oakridge, including a 70-yard run with the opening kickoff. Neil Diess, 180-pound three-year letterman, scored the other touchdown for the Warriors.

Webfoot Quits Due to Defensive Drill

The University of Oregon's 21-man varsity basketball squad through its first of a series of intensive defensive drills Monday in preparation for the second game of the season—against Willamette University's Navycats at McArthur court Friday night and at Salem Saturday. The inexperienced Webfoots dropped their first two games of the season last week-end to the Clatsop Coast Guard—by 67-58 and 33-44 scores. With Bob Hammons scoring 28 and Froeh Jim Averill 27 points in the series, Warren apparently has enough punch for the present. But allowing the opposition an average of 60 points per game indicated need of defensive work. Changing from a zone to a man-to-man defense in the second game, the Oregonians showed improvement. The Collegians were ahead of the service quintet until the final eight minutes of the Saturday night. With Bartlett and Del Smith at forwards, Ken Hays at center, Hamilton and Don Fulgham or Krotik at guards, Warren appears to have a credible offensive lineup—but one that will continually be threatened by other squad members.

Cadets Clinch No. 1 Rating

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—(AP)—It isn't the T-formation Army uses on the football field. It is the TNT-formation. The Cadets, who earned No. 1 ranking by defeating five mediocre teams and Duke, got themselves a bit of everlasting fame Saturday by crushing Notre Dame, the people's gridiron choice for a quarter of a century, 59-0. It was the worst defeat ever suffered by the Irish.

The contest added even more glamour to the Army-Navy game, scheduled for the secrecy of Annapolis on Dec. 2. Navy, laden—possibly overladen—with stars, got off to a bad start this fall but Saturday polished off Cornell 48-0 for its third straight victory. Army now has won seven consecutively, piling up a total of 419 points.

Before the service teams clash in their annual battle, the Cadets are listed against Pennsylvania this Saturday while the Middies collide with Purdue. Navy already has trounced Penn 26-0 and in each case of a common foe the Cadets have piled up a higher total.

Penn showed little effects of its drubbings by Navy and Michigan Saturday in stopping Columbia 35-7. Purdue comes east for Navy following its 27-7 decision over Northwestern. Both of the service schools are idle a week from Saturday in preparation for their own civil war.

Ohio State, civilian title-seeker of the Big Ten title, also gained added prestige by downing Pittsburgh 54-19, with the varsity playing a quarter. The Buckeyes now have the task of stung Illinois and Michigan on successive Saturdays. The Wolverines halted Claude "Buddy" Young long enough to defeat his Illinois mates 14-0.

Minnesota, which surprised Indiana 19-14, next takes on Iowa, while the Hoosiers should rebound at Pittsburgh's expense. Arkansas Southwest Surprise Wisconsin, which trimmed Iowa 26-7 with a three-touchdown blast in the final period of a game in which the Badger quarterback, Allen Shaffer, suffered fatal injuries, treks to Michigan.

Northwestern, winner of only one game has the chance of making it three defeats in a row for Notre Dame. Wake Forest, aiming for a bowl bid and an unbeaten season, was sidetracked by Duke 34-0 and now has a week of idleness. Duke, however, goes after South Carolina, a 28-7 conqueror of Presbyterian. Mississippi State, 26-21 victor over Auburn, tangles with strong Alabama Saturday. The Tide prepped for the contest by polishing off Mississippi 34-6. Georgia Tech, derailed by Duke a week ago, returned to form with a 34-7 win over Tulane.

Arkansas, the surprise of the Southwest circuit, pulled Rice off the top of the heap 12-7, and now mixes with lowly Southern Methodist. Texas, spilled by the Oklahoma Aggies 13-8, visits Texas Christian. In the same area, Tulsa battered Northwestern 51-0 and has a week's rest before meeting the Razorbacks. Randolph Field handled Maxwell Field 25-0, and now will try to duplicate Tulsa's point-production against Southwestern.

California and Southern California are Saturday's opponents in Berkeley. They tied in an early game and the Golden Bears lost to UCLA 7-0 in a rain-splattered game last week-end. Army's test against Pennsylvania and Navy's efforts with Purdue occupy the eastern sector although some interest is centered on unbeaten Yale. The Elis downed Brown 13-0 and entertain North Carolina next. Princeton, which opened its season with a 16-6 verdict over Muhlenberg, has Swarthmore as its second foe. The little Quakers romped over New York Saturday 21-0. Iowa Seahawk repulsed the challenge of the Bunker Hill naval station 33-7 and now relaxes until its Nov. 25 date with Iowa. Bainbridge trampled the Cherry Point Marines 50-7, to remain unbeaten over a two-year period, and Great Lakes scored two late markers to ground the Third Air Force 12-0. Marquette comes next for the Sailors.

15 Elevens Still Unbeaten

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Wake Forest, Harvard, Bunker Hill (Ind.), Navy and the Hon-do (Tex.) Army Air Field topped down the list of unbeaten and untied college football teams last week, reducing the elite group to 15.

2 Scores Nullified; Rockets Lose, 19-0

(By Associated Press) The San Diego Bombers racked up their seventh straight victory in Pacific coast professional football play by whitewashing the Oakland Giants, 39-0 Sunday.

In the rival American pro league, the San Francisco Clippers got back in the victory march by out driving the Los Angeles Mustangs, 21-6. Held on the defense during the first half, the Seattle Bombers pushed over three touchdowns in the final two periods to blank the faltering Portland Rockets, 19-0, in the American league's other game at Tacoma.

Two Portland tallies were called back in the first half when the officials ruled the whistle blew before Boy Layton's 65-yard gallop with a recovered fumble and assessed an offside penalty against the Rockets to nullify a 35-yard pass from Dave Gammon to Layton. Lavern Bell intercepted a Rocket pass on the Seattle 20 in the third period, raced to the Portland 20 and lateraled to Nello Burialli who went across for the initial tally of the game. Bell came back later to score the final two touchdowns, one on a 19-yard gallop over center and the other on a plunge from the 3.

Army's Glenn Davis Tops Nation's Grid Scorers—96 Points

17 Teams in Running For Orange Bowl Bids

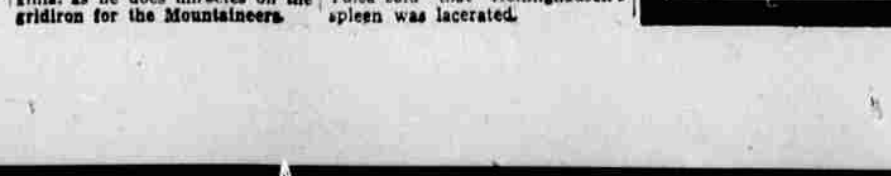

Ross Wins Mat Tourney Title; Johnson Decisions 'Grey Mask'

The jam-packed arena on Pearl Street had an exciting evening Saturday, with a newcomer to this town, Gust Johnson of Seattle, pulling a decision over the Grey Mask. Winner of the seven-man six-bout "traveling trophy" tourney, however, was Tony Ross, who walked off with the \$100 war bond, the silver loving cup plus the main-event purse.

The seven grapplers entered the ring at the start of Don Owen's weekly show to draw their places on the bill. The drawing results were: 1 and 2, Tarzan Potvin and Earl Malone; 3 and 4, Ross and Billy Marcus; 5 and 6, Johnson and the Mask, leaving Ernie Piluso with a bye and a stop in the semi-finals against the second bout winner.

The opening and semi-finals bouts were all 15-minute or one-fall, and the finale a 30-minute bout or one fall. The first action of the evening between Malone and Potvin lasted eight minutes of fast action. Malone, with a series of hard knees to the chest, knocked the wind out of Potvin and gave with a body slam that shook the whole arena to take the fall.

The second bout, between Ross and Marcus, was fast. Marcus, the Jewish newcomer from Honolulu, took most of the points and gained the decision. The first time on the local mat, Johnson really gave a splendid account of himself. The fans hailed him with cheers that shook the rafters—for his workout on the Mask and even in his loss to Ross, which might have been partially attributed to the fact that he had had more of a workout than any of the other men.

All in all, it was a very exciting and varied card.

Army Beats Navy 20-0 In European Battle

LONDON, Nov. 13.—(AP)—American doughboys and blue-jackets went back to the grim business of war today after taking time out to watch Army's GI football team drub a Navy eleven 20-0 in what both sides hoped unanimously would be the meeting for the European gridiron championship.

Expressing confidence that by this time next year they all would be "back home" watching their favorite college teams, the soldiers and sailors 60,000 strong stormed London's White City stadium for the game yesterday, which had all the color and rivalry of the annual service team meeting in the U. S.

The Army produced two first-period touchdowns and conversions, and in the third period delivered the coup de grace with a rousing 45-yard touchdown run by Ashley Anderson, former university of Wisconsin star. Anderson also scored the first touchdown when he drove through right guard for six yards after a sustained downfield drive of 72 yards. Earl Dosey, formerly of Purdue, made the other touchdown from eight yards out.

USC's Trojans rested Saturday and are pointing to a Nov. 25 meeting with UCLA for the final decision on the Pacific coast conference's representative in the New Year's day classic at Pasadena.

The Trojans and Bears tied 6-6 the first time they met Oct. 7. Out of the Rose Bowl race, Washington's Huskies take an early army club Saturday after absorbing a 28-0 licking at the hands of the powerful Fourth Air Force over the week-end. The Huskies meet the Second Air Force at Spokane Saturday.

UCLA prepares for the crucial game with USC by engaging College of Pacific, knocked over by San Francisco coast guard 13-0 Saturday.

Best coast service game of the day will be the Riverside clash between Fourth Air Force and San Diego naval training station. Fleet City Bluejackets, who bowled over Nevada 19-2 Saturday, tangle Sunday with St. Mary's pre-flight, week-end victors over Alameda coast guard by a 32-13 count.

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Chet Bukowski, 30-year-old Detroit war worker, was \$2000 richer today after carrying off the first-prize money individual bowling classic with an eight-game total of 1772.
