

Rules On Overseas Mail Announced

Christmas packages may be mailed without written request to soldiers who have left their home stations for overseas posts since Oct. 8, 1944, Postmaster F. L. Armitage said Thursday. Senders must present proof of change of address, the cards which have been sent to them with the soldiers' army post office number. Size restrictions laid down for general overseas mail still hold, and the package may not be

more than 15 inches long, more than 36 inches in combined length and girth, nor may it weigh over five pounds.

Army members overseas prior to the Oct. 8 date must have sent a request before a package can be mailed to them. One package a week may be mailed to members of the navy, marines and coast guard without such request. However, the post office department will not guarantee to get any package mailed after Oct. 15 deadline to boys overseas by Christmas, although special effort will be made to rush through the gifts sent to boys who went over after Oct. 6.

Any mail under eight ounces in weight may be sent to anyone without request, the postmaster said. He explained that anything under that weight is not classified as parcel post, and that, with first class postage, it may be sent anywhere.

Mrs. Ellen E. Turner, 73, widow of E. H. Turner, former mayor of Springfield, died Tuesday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. H. E. Maxey, of Springfield. She had been an invalid for several years.

Mrs. Turner was born as Ellen Elizabeth Twitchell, May 21, 1871, at Dummer, N. H. In 1890, she was married to E. H. Turner in Maine, and in 1908 the family came west to Wisconsin. Mr. Turner was engaged in logging operations in Wisconsin, and also in Washington, whence they moved in 1909. He had charge of large operations in logging and lumbering until 1923, when he went into operations of his own on a large scale on Puget Sound.

The family moved to Springfield in 1932, and Mrs. Turner had lived there continuously since, except for a few months of 1940 when in Corvallis. Mr. Turner died in Corvallis in December, 1940.

Surviving her are one daughter, Mrs. Marian Maxey; three grandchildren, Pvt. Bruce M. Maxey, with the U. S. army in France; Norman Maxey, of Springfield, and Robert F. Strand in the U. Farmers Advised To Buy Fertilizer Now

Farmers are advised to "take out insurance" against local or general shortages that may occur later and to buy their fertilizer for next year's needs now, according to V. N. Freeman, field supervisor for the emergency crop and feed loan administration here.

The fertilizer division of the

war foods administration warns that the situation is even more critical than last year, and that the tight labor situation, transportation difficulties and limited storage facilities off the farm make it essential that farm operators prepare now for next year's needs. Otherwise, they may be without fertilizer when they need it most.

Freeman explains that emergency loans are available through his office in the Eugene post-office building to provide funds enabling farm operators to purchase the needed amounts at any time.

Eugene Man Fined \$200 For Yoncalla Gunplay

Edwin D. Rathbone, Eugene osteopath, pleaded guilty to a grand jury indictment charging him with assault with a dangerous weapon and paid a fine of \$200 in circuit court in Roseburg this week.

According to District Attorney H. A. Canady, Rathbone was accused of threatening G. W. Williams, Yoncalla garage man, with a gun when Williams refused to repair an automobile tire after regular working hours.

The Roseburg story said that the garage man's wife crept up behind Rathbone and struck the gun upward, deflecting the bullet into the garage ceiling when the weapon went off. The Eugene man told the court he and some friends were on a hunting party, that he had had a few drinks of beer and that he did not know what he was doing. He said he "deeply regretted" his action.

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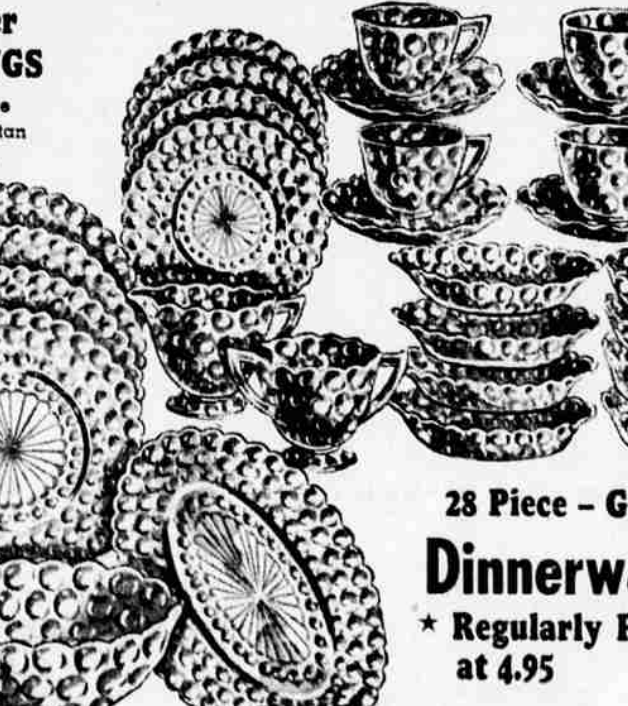
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
