

FDR Gives Priority To Big Three Parley

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—(AP)—President Roosevelt made clear today that his projected meeting with Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Stalin would take priority over his hope of visiting Paris. He indicated also that his Churchill-Stalin meeting might be at some point far removed from the French capital.

Roosevelt told his news conference he hoped some day to accept an invitation from Gen. Charles De Gaulle to visit Paris. But at the present time, he said, it is more important to see the prime minister and there is a question of geography which comes in, too.

He gave listeners the impression that in the term prime minister embraced also Premier Stalin, for a preceding question concerned his progress toward a meeting with both Churchill and Stalin.

In reply, Roosevelt had said he had made no progress yet, although all three of the allied leaders want to see each other.

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Belton Lists Senate Pledges

PORTLAND, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Leadership of Oregon's next legislature was assured today, with Sen. Howard Belton of Canby as president of the senate and Rep. Eugene Marsh of McMinnville as speaker of the house.

The two men hold pledges of more than enough votes to guarantee their election at the legislative caucus Jan. 7.

Sen. Belton, who has been vying with Sen. Earl T. Newbury of Jackson county, disclosed names of 21 pledges—five more than necessary. Marsh already had been assured of sufficient backers.

Belton said he held written pledges from Sens. H. C. Wheeler, Charles H. Zurcher, J. N. Jones, E. R. Fatland, Angus Gibson, George P. Winslow, Frank H. Hilton, Irving Rand, Lee Patterson, Paul L. Patterson, Marshall E. Cornett, Merle R. Chessman, Lew Wallace, and William E. Walsh.

Belton said pledges have been mailed by Sens. Dean H. Walker, P. J. Stadelman, Frederick S. Lamport, John H. Carson, Dr. William A. Moser and Dr. Joel C. Booth. Belton's own vote is the 21st.

Application Open For Varied Work

Caseworkers, stenographers, typists, and clerks will be interested in the announcement by the merit system council that applications for such positions are being received on a continuous basis. Examinations will be given as often as enough applications are received to make the procedure practical, reports Max L. Dudley, administrator of the county welfare commission.

The first system council serves the state and county public welfare commissions, the state unemployment compensation commission, the state and county boards of health, and the crippled children's division of the University of Oregon medical school. Caseworker positions are now available with the welfare; stenographic and clerical help is needed by all four agencies; and accounting clerks and assistant accountants are particularly needed by the unemployment compensation commission.

The first examination date for the new series has been tentatively set as Dec. 18. All applications received by Dec. 6 will be included in this examination. Some applicants may be asked to accept positions while awaiting examination, permanent appointment to be dependent upon successful completion of the examination.

Positions under the merit system are particularly desirable, for they carry certain rights of tenure, sick leave, and vacation leave. The merit system is operated under the requirements of the federal social security board.

Application forms and further information are available at local public welfare, board of health or unemployment compensation offices, but completed applications must be sent to the merit system supervisor, 618 Mead building, Portland 4, Ore.

Post-War Jobs Big Task, Says Morse

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 17.—(AP)—One of the big tasks facing the Pacific northwest, says U. S. Senator-Elect Wayne L. Morse, is the problem of creating jobs and wealth after the war, and one way to help solve it is for western senators to hang together.

"We must have a greater unity among the western senators back in Washington in order to get the eastern part of the United States to recognize the industrial importance of the west," Morse told the Association of Oregon Counties at the opening session here yesterday.

"I plan to spend as much time as possible in Washington visiting various departments and agencies that have jurisdiction over various job-creating and wealth-creating projects with a view to keeping them informed of the industrial possibilities of the northwest."

U. S. Sen. Guy Cordon, who spoke briefly, also stressed co-operation.

Dr. Victor P. Morris, chairman of the Oregon committee on post-war readjustment and development, said that an expanding private enterprise system would be necessary to bring about the

sought-for development of the northwest.

Prominent on the program for today's closing session were the election of officers and adoption of resolutions on proposed new legislation.

Death Comes To 'Cotton Ed'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Sen. Ellison D. "Cotton Ed" Smith of South Carolina died today at his home in Lynchburg, his office here was advised.

Smith had been bucking new deal leadership of the democratic party for years and formed an anti-new deal committee to oppose the fourth term ticket this year.

Smith once said that if he had not been so lazy he could have been as great a man as John C. Calhoun, South Carolina's patron saint.

Despite his confessed laziness, however, Smith got himself elected to the senate in 1909 and remained there until his death.

Not even the persuasive voice of President Roosevelt could blast him out. A "purge" target in 1938, Smith put on the campaign of his life, and Gov. Olin D. Johnston's Roosevelt-backed candidacy struck a snag. But Johnston defeated the veteran this year in the democratic primary.

Smith's entire political career was based on a platform of three planks—white supremacy, a tariff for revenue only and more important, state's rights. He did not let an opportunity pass to emphasize it.

Liberty Ship Named For McNary Christened

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 17.—(AP)—The Liberty ship Charles L. McNary was christened here late yesterday by WAC Corporal Jean Ann Richards of Union, Ore. The vessel honors the late Oregon senator.

Corporal Richards, who was invited to Houston for the ceremony, is a former 4-H champion club girl in Oregon and was a princess last year at the Pendleton roundup.

Hunt Sentenced To Year In Jail Here

Vernon E. Hunt, arraigned in circuit court Thursday on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a child, entered his plea, Friday morning. He entered an oral plea of guilty and waived time for sentence. Circuit Court Judge G. F. Skipworth then sentencing him to one year in the county jail, the court reserving the right to parole him at the expiration of five months of the sentence. H. V. Johnson was appointed by the court to represent Hunt as attorney.
