

Hurd's Election Cost \$283, Report

The Hurd for county judge committee spent a total of \$283.11 during the pre-election campaign, it is revealed in the committee's report of expenditures, filed in the office of the county clerk Monday by C. S. Dillon, treasurer of the committee. Contributions to the fund amounted to \$280, given by the republican central committee and individuals.

Phil J. Bartholomew of Springfield, who was elected county coroner, paid out nothing in cash to induce the people to vote for him, according to his statement of expenses, filed Monday. He was the nominee of both the republicans and democrats.

County Clerk Walter B. Dillard spent \$30.35 during his campaign for re-election on the republican ticket. The sum was spent for newspaper advertising and printing cards.

C. E. Wheaton, who was re-elected justice of the peace at Springfield, said he paid out nothing for election expenses.

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—The labor board has announced appointment of John D. Galey, Portland attorney, as chairman and William S. Lubersky as vice-chairman of the west coast lumber commission here.

Since resignation of Ben H. Kizer as chairman in October to become chief of the China area office of the UNRRA, Galey has been acting chairman of the commission.

Lubersky, also a Portland attorney, was assistant to Wayne L. Morse, senator-elect from Oregon, when he was a public member of the war labor board.

The commission has jurisdiction in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and California.

Chen Cheng Rated As Top Fighter

CHUNGKING (AP)—Three-star Gen. Chen Cheng, who succeeded Gen. Ho Ying-chin as China's war minister in the Chungking cabinet shake-up, is one of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's best trusted and meritorious fighters.

The short, lightly-built rosy-cheeked 38-year-old general hails from the same district as Chiang-Fenghua district—near Ningpo on the eastern Chekiang coast, and was the generalissimo's school mate at Paoting military academy.

Chen followed Chiang in the latter's famous northern expedition of 1926-28 when the Kuomintang's nationalist troops overthrew all the northern warlords and unified China proper.

Chen did not emerge as a hero, however, until 1934, when he was the leader of the "fifth encirclement" campaign against the Chinese communists based in the south China province of Kiangsi.

Chen's success forced the communists to abandon Kiangsi and undertake their famed "long march" to northwest China and the present red capital of Yenan.
