

Power Control Aired

BOZEMAN, Idaho, Nov. 29.—(AP)—An unscheduled debate of the merits of public power highlighted the closing sessions of the north Idaho chamber of commerce conference yesterday.

A verbal flurry resulted when Dr. Crosby, Spokane, public relations director of the Washington Power company, criticized public power zealots determined to obtain control of the sale and distribution of northwest power.

Warren delegates that although "hasn't yet been invaded," they should be "on the lookout."

In answer, Bonneville power administrator Paul J. Raver, who followed Crosby on the speaking schedule, laid aside a low-cost power, and asserted that low-cost power was essential to attract private enterprise, payrolls, population and capital.

"If the price policies of private distributors are wrong, it is they that block the purposes for which the two great dams (Bonneville and Grand Coulee) have been erected," he declared.

Fines For Alcoholics Called Ludicrous

PORTLAND, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Alcoholics can be successfully treated only if trained workers diagnose the factors that lead to excessive drinking, including age, occupation and marital status, Dr. Seldon D. Bacon said here.

Dr. Bacon, of Yale university's laboratory of applied physiology, told the alcoholic studies conference that fines and jail sentences as cures are "ludicrous."

Traditional methods have failed to solve the problem and "we must have greater clarification of types of alcoholism, testing of treatments and new discoveries," he declared.

He said that 99 per cent of alcoholics fall into seven or eight classifications, and many are "good bets" for treatment.

Heavy Resistance Met Near Faenza

ROME, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Eighth army troops pushing into the Po valley are meeting heavy resistance in the Albereto area about five miles northeast of Faenza, allied headquarters announced today.

South of Faenza, British and Indian troops of the 5th army have made further progress in high ground to the north and west of Modigliana.

Strong enemy raids on American 5th army positions below Bologna have been driven off, the communique said.

Air operations were restricted by weather. The Mediterranean allied air forces flew approximately 470 sorties yesterday, from which three aircraft are missing.

Mott Says Post-war WPA Being Planned

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Rep. Mott (R-Ore.) declared here that "bureaucratic planners" in the present administration are ready to set up a post-war WPA.

He made his statement during house debate on a \$1,500,000,000 post-war roads building measure.

Mott offered an amendment, which was defeated, to boost the allocation to \$1,800,000,000.

He termed the lower figure "completely inadequate," and added "unless we provide enough money bureaucratic planners in the administration will set up a post-war agency like the WPA and build the highways without asking congress about it."

The house tentatively approved an amendment by Rep. Wolcott (R-Mich.) that would permit the "post-war" federal-aid road program to begin before the war ends. . . . Just as soon as congress appropriates the money.

Food Prices Show Increase At Portland

PORTLAND—(AP)—The cost of eating is still on the upgrade. Portland food prices inched 1.2 per cent upward last month, the bureau of labor statistics reported. Most of the increase was caused by eggs, whose prices skyrocketed 19 per cent.

Other food staples seesawed only slightly—fresh meats, fruits, and vegetables generally lower; apples, canned tomatoes, round steak and coffee slightly higher.

Seattle's food costs rose 1.1 per cent, San Francisco 1.3 per cent, and Los Angeles 1.1 per cent. Around the rest of the nation, however, food prices dropped 0.4 per cent.

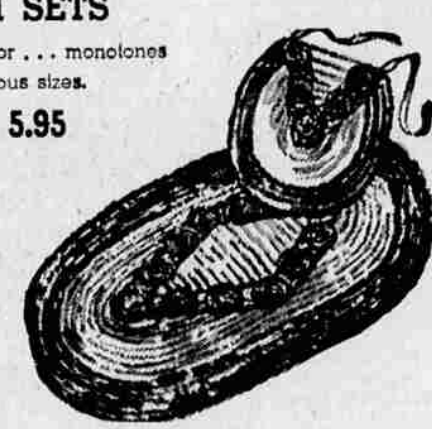
