Sedition Trial Halted By Death Of Judge

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—(U.P.)—The seven-month-old sedition trial came to an end today when Federal Judge Edward C. Eicher, who has presided over the proceedings since they started April 17, died of a heart attack.

Eicher's death automatically ended the current trial. The indictment under which the case was being tried still stands. The justice department must decide whether to start the trial all over again. The original indictment named 30 defendants but only 26 were still being tried.
