

No Cigaretts? Match Shortage May Be Next Smokers' Worry

WASHINGTON—During the war, everyone was singing: "You've got a lucifer to light that cigarette, smile, boys, that's the way." Now you have neither the lucifer nor the cigarette, so everyone's singing the blues.

Match production board match shortage, you can now add to the shortage of cigarettes. As it is, the match shortage is predicted to be almost entirely due to the disappearance of the match.

Match buyers from now on will get 30 per cent of penny matches, 25 per cent of the regular matches. That will amount to an even bigger take than the estimate of 40,000,000 large matches, 34,000,000 small matches, and about 1,000,000 matches of the small match-books included in K-rations, plus navy's share of 300,000,000 penny boxes, and 433,000,000 penny boxes.

U. S. match-making figures, according to department of commerce, are down from 1941's high point of 500,000,000, back to 433,000,000. Figures for 1944 are not yet available.

Production is off a bit, demand is higher with military buyers scooping up big amounts, imports are down, exports are up. However it strikes you, you'll probably be looking for a cigarette lighting fixture soon, if it's no more than something in which to tote a bundle of kitchen matches.

Course On Far East Offered On Campus

A new correspondence course "History of the Far East" is scheduled to begin under Dr. Harold J. Noble, associate professor of history at the University of Oregon, Miss Mabelle Hair, head of correspondence study for the general extension division of the state system of higher education, announces.

Dr. Noble is unusually well qualified to teach this timely subject, Miss Hair stated, having been born in Korea and having taught in the college in Seoul, Korea, from 1926 to 1929. He also taught in Kyoto, Japan, from 1939 to 1940 in the college there. He returned to the campus this fall after doing intelligence work for the armed forces in the Bougainville area.

Aim of the course, according to Dr. Noble, is to give general knowledge of eastern Asia, primarily China and Japan, emphasizing the vast changes that have taken place since the middle of the 19th century.

The study of the far east will be brought up to date during the course, showing the role of the United States in this section, and how the influence of Great Britain has waned there leaving the United States and Russia to play the dominant parts now.

Nine hours credit will be given those who want it toward a university degree.

TRAFFIC

1. Observe the speed regulations.
2. Check periodically on brakes, lights and other equipment.

HOME

1. Keep stairs well-lighted and free of obstructions.

5. Keep matches, pins, needles and medicines out of children's reach.

INDUSTRIAL

1. Know the hazards of your job and avoid them.
2. Keep machinery-protective guards in place.
3. Wear goggles, protective clothing, safety shoes.
4. Don't try to adjust or repair moving machinery.
5. Get first aid for even small injuries.

FARM

1. Always stop a machine before unclogging, oiling, or adjusting it.
2. Know how to notch and guide a tree so it will fall the way you want it to.
3. Keep guns unloaded except when you are using them. But always treat a gun, loaded or not, as though it were loaded.
4. If a rowboat you're in overturns, stay with it. It will float.
5. Remember, when animals cause injury, it's usually because they're frightened. Speaking calmly, especially when you approach them, helps keep them calm.
