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Work On Power Line Starts January 1

Actual construction work on the 43 miles of transmission lines to be built to carry Bonneville power from Eugene to Drain will start about Jan. 1, according to information from the Eugene office of the Bonneville administration.

Contract for the project recently was awarded the Tice Electric company of Portland on a bid of \$121,416.08. The project engineer has stated that construction plans will be in shape to turn over to the contractor so

work can be started by the first of the year.

The 26 miles between Eugene and Cottage Grove will be constructed first. Douglas Electric Cooperative is building the lines, which will be leased to Bonneville on a long-term basis.

\$10,000 before the close of the drive. Eugene's winner of the retail merchant's award was announced Wednesday as being F. W. Woolworth and Co. William Lush, store manager, revealed that his employees, from which two corsage winners have been selected, had sold \$12,825 in bonds and about \$600 in stamps up to Tuesday night.

Half-Way Over Lane county itself had gone over the half-way mark in E-bond sales by Wednesday, Nash disclosed, and added that several recently confirmed allocations had swelled the totals considerably. Purchases of E-bonds now register at \$716,219.50, making the \$1,314,000 quota increasingly attainable. Total sales of all issues of bonds were reported at \$2,830,537, and, although mounting, are still a far enough cry from the county's quota of \$4,100,000 to keep workers busy.

Nine more allocations were credited this week to Lane county's sixth war loan, with one especially outstanding. Doubling the amount allocated in previous war bond campaigns, the federal land bank of Spokane credited the purchase of \$72,000 worth of bonds to Lane county, according to James R. Brown, secretary-treasurer of the Eugene group of national farm loan association. Brown revealed that the land bank was allocating the campaign a total of \$400,000, the county allocations to be based upon the number of land bank borrowers in each.

The other eight allocations were credited to Lane county by the following: Oregon state board of higher education, \$11,000; J. J. Newberry, \$3,000; Equitable Savings and Loan association, \$50,000; Block's shoe store, \$10,000; General Petroleum corporation, \$16,500; Union Oil company of California, \$8,250; Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., \$25,000; and Zellerbach Paper Co., \$8,000.

portfolio in the Italian government which resigned 10 days ago, and Eden said Britain did not oppose his holding a job other than that of foreign minister. Ivanoe Bonomi, who once resigned as Italian premier, still is trying to form a new government.

The British press commented sharply on the American note. It was rude and meant to be so, said The Manchester Guardian. The Yorkshire Post said it smacked of self-righteousness. Both newspapers recalled British opposition to the American-supported Darlan administration in north Africa.

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
