Two Lane Scouts Get Eagle Rank at Court of Honor Here

Kernit Chapman of troop 88, Glenwood, and Norleigh Alford of troop 31, Thurston, received the rank of eagle scout, highest advancement award presented by the Boy Scouts of America, at the Lane district court of honor Thursday at Wilson Junior high school.

Official presentation of the award was made by Dr. N. H. Comish of the Oregon Trail council advancement committee, who asked the mothers of the two scouts to pin the badges on their sons. In addition to their parents, recognition was given by Comish to Chapman's scoutmaster, G. N. McCullough, and to Alford's scoutmaster, Amos Gilmour.

The eagle scout award represents the earning of 21 merit badges, 13 of which are required, satisfactory service for a period of at least six months after becoming a life scout, and demonstration of leadership ability. Both scouts originally belonged to troop 28, Creswell, of which L. E. Zinkler is scoutmaster, but transferred to the Glenwood and Thurston troops when they were organized last spring.

Both Chapman and Alford are senior patrol leaders of their troops and both served as senior patrol leaders last summer at Camp Lucky Boy, summer camp of the Oregon Trail council. They are also members of the Tsigan lodge of the Order of the Arrow, national brotherhood of Boy Scout honor campers.
