

Australian Will Address C. C. Forum

A businessman's description of Australia today, will be the theme of a forum meeting program to be sponsored by the Eugene chamber of commerce, next Friday noon, Dec. 15, Osburn hotel, according to Dr. Chas. E. Hunt, forum chairman.

Sidney Cornick, director of two Australian firms, presently touring the United States to investigate and study industrial processes as a guide to similar developments in Australia, will be the featured speaker. Cornick, accepting the Eugene invitation, indicated interest by his country in the new chemical processes for recovering values from mill waste.

The meeting, Dr. Hunt stated, would be open to the public, and it is believed that students from the commerce department of the university will attend to hear the current description of business methods "down under."

The firms represented by Cornick are situated in Woolloomooloo, New South Wales, Australia.

The program opened with a processional, "It Came Upon A Midnight Clear" by Willis.

The University Singers, a group of 36 women, under the direction of Donald W. Allton, assistant professor of music, presented a group of Christmas songs from many lands. Their first group included "Angels O'er The Fields," old French carol, "The Shepherd's Song," Swiss folk song, "Christmas Song of The Shepherds," Austrian Carol, "Carol of the Russian Children," White Russia. Accompanists were Betty Jane Bennett, Portland, and Patricia Metcalf, Corvallis.

"The Story of the Nativity" was presented in tableau under the direction of Mrs. Otilie Seybold, associate professor of speech and dramatic arts. The part of "Mary" was taken by Jean Ballentyne, Honolulu, Hawaii, and John Moore of Newport Beach, Calif., took the part of "Joseph." Narrator was David Shay of Portland. Dorothy Bruhn, Eugene, played the harp during the tableau.

"Manger Lullaby" by Bess Newton was the next song of the university singers.

Following this, Dr. Wesley G. Nicholson, of the First Congregational church in Eugene, spoke on the "Meaning of Christmas." He brought out in his address three levels in the moral growth of mankind, first, the dawn of conscience difference between right and wrong, second, the level of right as a duty, and third, when men do right because they want to do right.

W. F. G. Thacher, professor of advertising in the school of journalism, introduced the speaker at the luncheon. Special guests

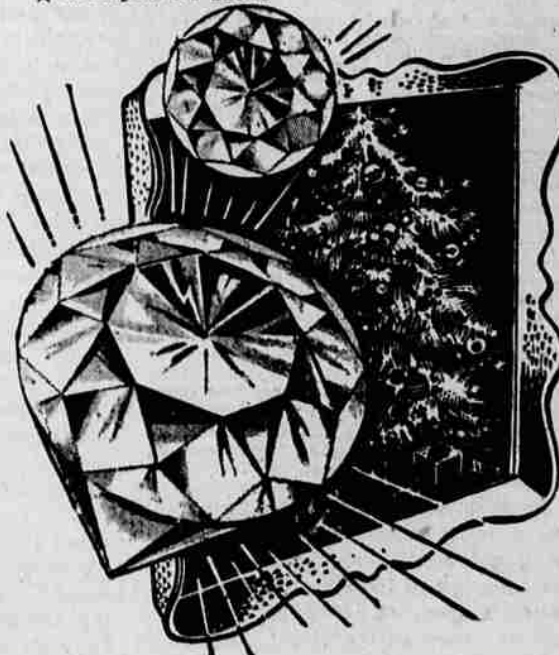
Morse Reception 5-7 P. M. Sunday

COURT OF HONOR

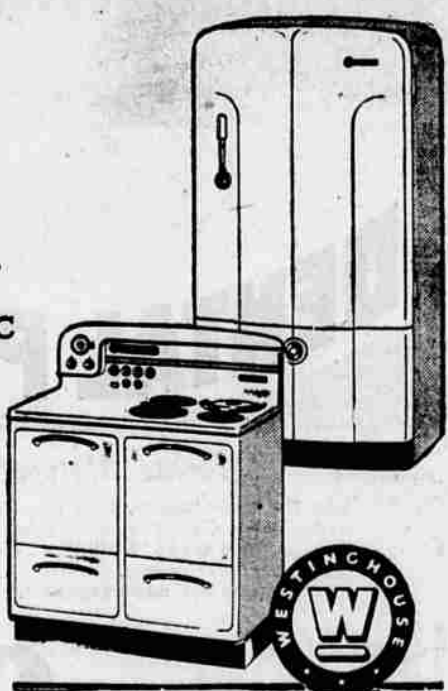

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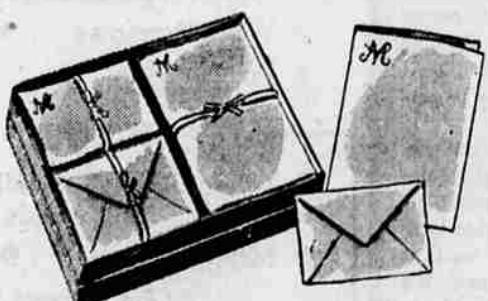
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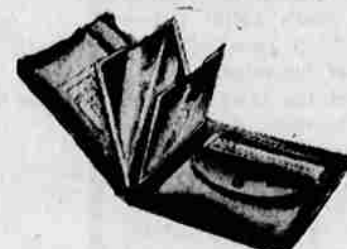
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
