

U. O. Geologist Believes Japan Has Concealed Quake Damage

"Japan is one of the most earthquake ridden parts of the globe," Dr. Warren D. Smith, head of the geology and geophysics department at the University of Oregon, said in commenting on the recent Japanese earthquake, adding that the damage probably was far greater than Japan has disclosed. "There is a trench running through Nagoya where they have the maximum amount of disturbance. Nagoya is one of Japan's largest industrial cities."

AAUW Resolution For Mrs. Schwering

Eugene branch, American Association of University Women, at its last meeting passed a resolution of condolence on the death of Hazel Prutsman Schwering, University of Oregon dean of women. "Whereas, Dean Schwering was active in the councils of the American Association of University Women, serving formerly as president of the Eugene branch and at the time of her death as vice-president of the state association,

Therefore: Be it resolved by the members of the Eugene branch of the American Association of University Women that we express publicly our appreciation of the life and work of Hazel Prutsman Schwering and our sense of great loss through her untimely death. Also, that this expression of our appreciation be made known to the members of her family.

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out, we must remember that all the forces we can muster are infinitesimally small compared to nature. "However in this unstable region if things are about to slip, if a volcano is about ready to erupt, bombing may act as a trigger to set it off."

Dr. Smith recalled hearing Dr. Omori, with a party of scientists in Hawaii a number of years ago, discuss earthquakes in the Pacific area. Dr. Omori, a Japanese, was then the leading seismologist in the world. We have today Omori's law to the effect that upon the same belt the earthquakes do not appear in succession as an extension of the first disturbance or along the belt in a sort of progression, but relief first having been found in one province, the next disturbance is likely to occur in a distant section of the belt.

"If this be true, and I certainly would not call it a law," Dr. Smith said, "we should expect the next big earthquake to be either in California or Chile."

However, Smith emphasized, we do not know enough yet about these phenomena to make any sure predictions and he is not doing so.

Not Telling Much
"We can be sure that Japan is not giving out any more information than they have to about this earthquake," he continued, "but my guess is that the damage has been of far greater scope than they would have us believe. One of the worst features of the Japanese earthquake is Tsunami, a Japanese word for the so-called but mis-called tidal wave which is not a tidal wave but a seismic wave. These have done untold damage in Japan."

Dr. Smith recalled that occasionally a huge wave strikes the Oregon coast and has taken fishermen out to sea. These, he believes, are probably Tsunamis.

In conclusion Dr. Smith said that he was in entire agreement with the statement made in New York following the recent earthquake by Father Lynch of Fordham university, whom he designated as one of the best qualified students of seismology in this country.

Public Warned Against Unexploded Shells

SALEM, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The state civilian defense council warned all persons today against handling unexploded artillery shells, and asked that such shells be reported by telephone to the nearest military or civil authorities.

The council said three children have been killed and three others injured on the coast by explosions of live ammunition and "dud" projectiles. "With the return to civilian occupancy of areas formerly used for training of troops, the possibility of the discovery and the subsequent handling of unexploded ammunition and 'duds' is expected to increase. The danger to unauthorized persons handling this ammunition cannot be over-emphasized," the council said.

New Guinea Native 'King' Captured

MELBOURNE, (U.P.)—A 29-year-old New Guinea native, Aumaid, who was induced by the Japanese to set up a government 30 miles inland and proclaim himself king of New Guinea, has been captured by Australian troops, the Australian radio reported in a broadcast recorded by CBS.

"Aumaid founded his own religion, recruited a standing army, and challenged the Australians to come and get him," the broadcast said.

"By preaching the Japanese doctrine of ancestor worship, he gained sway over 8,000 natives. He founded an army of 600, armed with Japanese grenades and a few Japanese rifles. His military advisers were two Japanese who had been driven into the jungles by the Australians."

The broadcast said that Aumaid fled when the Australians broke into his enclosure but was later caught.

State Library Reports To Legislature

SALEM, Ore.—(U.P.)—The biennial report to the state legislature, prepared by the state library, has been released, detailing the activities of the organization during the past two years.

A total of 277,640 books have been loaned to residents of the state, the report showed, and 45,533 have been loaned to members of the armed services.

The collection of books in the library now totals nearly half a million. Traveling libraries have reorganized so that even smaller schools may have efficient service. Much of the work done was with other libraries of the state, while the special activities were numerous, the report stated.

American Push In Reich Frees Doughboys

SARREGUEMINES, FRANCE, Dec. 11.—(Delayed)—(U.P.)—A thousand grinning young allied soldiers captured by the Germans in eastern Europe were liberated today when forward elements of the 35th division overran their prison camp at the outskirts of Sarreguemines.

The group included Russian, Polish, Serbian, Yugoslav and Italian soldiers. Among them was a Polish lieutenant who had been held in various prison camps since the day the Germans entered Warsaw more than five years ago.

For three days the prisoners had listened intently as the sounds of battle came closer and closer. Early this morning they put on their best uniforms because they knew this was the day.

When a company led by Capt. Joseph Giacobello of Mount Union, Pa. drove the Germans into a forest back of the camp and entered the prison enclosure, the men lined up behind officers and smartly gave the salutes of many countries.

Then they burst into cheers. When Lt. Col. George Connell of Emporia, Kans., commander of the 2nd battalion of the 177th regiment, arrived, a Polish lieutenant and an Italian medical corps captain whisked him inside and served coffee prepared from supplies in an American Red Cross parcel.

While German machine gun bullets thudded against a building 100 feet away, I talked to a Pole who said the Germans took 150 American prisoners into Germany night before last.

Americans captured on D-day were kept in a different camp, the Pole said.

"When you kept coming, they took your boys away," he said.

"I've been a German prisoner five years and two months—since the Germans entered Warsaw—and I wish Americans to know that their Red Cross parcels saved our lives here because we would have starved without them."
