**Court Imposes Fine
For Gasoline Theft**
Eddie Duncan, Eugene, appeared
in the local justice court Thursday
afternoon on a charge of stealing
gasoline from a service station.
He pleaded guilty and Justice
Brownell fined him \$25 with the
admonition that if he got in trou-
ble again, the penalty would be
much more severe.

The defendant, in his statement,
denied the actual stealing of the
gasoline, but admitted that he sat
in the automobile while a young
man companion, with his acquies-
cence and approval, syphoned the
gasoline from the station and then,
with others, took a ride over
town. He had previously been ar-
rested on a charge of entering an
automobile with intent to steal.
