No Action Taken For New School

Junction Church Working In Crusade

JUNCTION CITY—The Methodist church has launched its part in the national church's "crusade." While it is in part financial, it is in no sense a "drive" or a "campaign." It is, in short, a crusade for a post-war fund of \$25,000,000 for relief and rebuilding of Methodist projects after the war, as well as for a deepening of evangelism and teaching right now.

The local Methodist churches in Riverview and Junction City began the crusade on Christmas Sunday with white gift offerings. Riverview, with 55 children and adults present, gave \$156.75 in cash and a \$10.00 pledge for a total of \$166.75. Another \$24.00 has been underwritten by the Women's Society of Christian Service, of which Mrs. J. G. Swan is president. In the Junction City congregation with 150 present, the total was \$274.00, of which \$221.00 is cash.

These offerings are to be set aside, with the gifts from 40,000 American Methodist churches, for a post-war fund that will help to rebuild war-devastated lives. Methodism is planted in 17 European countries. The work in Korea began only from New Testaments sent over from China, but today the need for missionary aid is acute. Korea having been occupied by Japan since 1910, the leaders say.

These gifts are made in the face of severe local needs. The Junction City people are looking toward a new church, and Riverview folk plan repairs on their house of worship.

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The Monroe Youth Fellowship group enjoyed a holiday party at the Methodist Community church Sunday evening.

Seventy children attended the Christmas party given by the week-day Primary Bible class under the leadership of their teacher, Mrs. Louise Bowen, for pre-school children. The pre-school children, 43 in number, were presented with booklets made by the primary class.
