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Winter Driving Tips Offered Motorists

If you can't start your car in sleety, icy or rainy weather, it is too bad—but if you can't stop it in such weather, that may be real tragedy, according to Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell.

In urging motorists to avoid accidents that may lay up automobiles because of irreplaceable parts, as well as causing deaths and injuries, Farrell emphasized the increased traffic hazards as a result of winter weather conditions.

"While state and county road crews are doing excellent work keeping our roads and highways in the best possible condition, perfect road maintenance is almost impossible due to wartime conditions," Farrell pointed out.

"Manpower shortage, material shortage and increased wear on roads in many sections of Oregon combine to increase the difficulty of first class road maintenance."

Farrell said the national safety council's committee on winter driving hazards has found that reduced visibility and poor traction are the most frequent causes of accidents in winter time.

The driver can do much to meet these hazards, by keeping windshield wipers and defrosters in good condition, by using chains on ice and snow and by driving with greater care.

"In the last analysis, safe driving in winter is up to the individual, since even perfectly maintained roads and perfect equipment will not prevent accidents if the men at the wheel does not do his part," Farrell emphasized.

He listed these tips for safe winter driving:

"Drive with others as you would have them drive with you."

"Use mass transportation whenever possible. You won't get a new car until months after Hitler, Hirohito and Co. have been disposed of."

"If you must drive in severe weather, prepare your car as well as you possibly can, and set out determined to get to your job for our soldiers' sakes."

"Use tire chains on ice and snow, for safe stopping and forward traction."

"Don't get too close to the car in front. Maybe his chains are in his garage."

"Don't assume that wartime 35 is a safe speed on all surfaces. Make that your top, and cut down to conform to road conditions."

"Keep your windshield clear. Give the man behind you a chance. Signal turns and stops, and both of you will get to your jobs. The country needs you both, and both your automobiles."

AIR AWARDS GIVEN

First Lt. Joseph V. Andrews, 23, son of Mrs. Mahala Andrews, route 1, and pilot of "That's All Jack," a B17 Flying Fortress of the 452nd bombardment group, has been awarded a fourth oak leaf cluster.

The medal was awarded for "meritorious achievement" while taking part in the bombing attacks on German targets, and on Nazi military strong-points, in support of advances by allied ground forces. The presentation was made by his group commander.

'Know Your City' Is Theme Of Toastmasters Club Talks

"Know Your City" was the theme of the Toastmasters program Tuesday night at the Eugene hotel, with Fred Brenne as toastmaster, and Dr. R. E. Walstrom, president, presiding.

Industry and agriculture of the Eugene area were described by Ed Thurston. Thurston suggested the possibility that new manufacturing industries using lumber could well make Eugene their location and mentioned some already here

such as the plywood plants and the alcohol from wood plant now under construction at Springfield.

Carroll Adams, speaking on recreation, outlined the possibilities in park development, stressing the idea of a park on the flat Amazon creek area south of Nineteenth street. Adams called attention to the possibilities for bicycle and horse trails, for family recreation and for sports in such a park. He also pointed out that in order to serve the public a park should be easily reached.

The Business and Professional Women's club and the Officers' Wives have started a park fund for Eugene with initial contributions totaling more than \$1700. This money has been turned over to the Century of Progress Fund and anyone now may contribute to it as much or as little as he wishes.

In making the presentation of this fund, the two women's groups also called attention to the possibilities in a park in the area at the south of the city.

The subject of fire protection was handled by George Heidinger, who stressed the work done by the Eugene department with reduced manpower and called attention to a proposal for additional fire stations.

The city manager system of government adopted by Eugene was outlined by Roch Bradshaw, who declared that in cities where the manager plan has succeeded, best it has had the active support of the voters. He urged that the citizens of Eugene get behind the manager government to make its success as great as possible.

Social trends of today and where they are leading the nation were discussed by C. E. McLean. He called attention to the recent statement that one out of every 12 births in the United States is illegitimate and declared that this situation is something to make every citizen ponder social problems soberly.
