## Szigeti Concert January 14 Interests Civic Music Group

Anticipated by members of the Eugene Civic Music association for next Sunday afternoon, Jan. 14, will be the concert of Joseph Szigeti, world renowned violinist, in the association's fourth concert of the season.

The Szigeti concert will be at 5 p.m. next Sunday, McArthur court, admittance being by membership card in the association only.

Recognized as one of the world's great violinists, Szigeti is noted for his versatility and his mastery of all styles — classic, romantic, modern. His world fame has been achieved through two round-the-world tours, 11 tours of Soviet Russia, and nearly two decades of coast-to-coast tours in America.

At present, Szigeti also has won wide acclaim for his ever ready willingness to lend his talent in furthering the war effort, and he has volunteered for USO and army camp performances, raised thousands of dollars for the treasury department in war bonds programs, and has made appearances before thousands for all the United Nations Relief agencies.

Keeps Up Schedule

This type of work is the part Szigeti refuses to lessen, in spite of an increasingly arduous concert schedule that takes him each season to the principal cities of the country and includes appearances as soloist with every major symphony orchestra.

Szigeti is one artist who receives united praise from composers, who usually are shy and critical of performers. Richard Strauss has said: "I raise my glass to Szigeti's wonderful playing of the Brahms." Serge Prokofiev has said: "Greatest interpreter of my D major Concerto."

Ernest Bloch said: "I can't describe my emotion in listening to your records of my concerto! What a joy to hear it come to life with such color, such astonishing contrasts, so much imagination."

Few individual artists have been heard by as many and as frequently over the radio as Szigeti. His recordings also are among the most popular in the world.
