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Junior Safety Patrols Working Out Well

Eugene's newly-formed safety patrols, which went into action with the opening of the winter school term, have been working out very well, according to authorities in charge.
Delmar E. Cash, member of the Eugene city police force, who was instrumental in organizing the patrol and instructing the 100 boys who are its members, reported that most motorists have been very cooperative in observing the patrol members and their red-flagged directions, but that greater caution must be exercised. He asked motorists to watch closely at all corners near schools and to make special effort to observe patrol members' directions.

Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell has praised the work of junior safety patrols for their work in protecting the lives of school students as they cross streets in the school areas.
"There have been no fatalities at crossings protected by school safety patrols this year," he said. "As the use of these patrols increases, I believe we will see an important improvement."

Results of a recent survey, however, indicate that traffic fatalities among the 5-14 age group are on the increase this year, reversing the trend of the past several years, Farrell reported. For the first 10 months of 1944, there were 29 fatalities among children in this group, compared to 17 for the same period of 1943, or an increase of 71 per cent.
In this group, pedestrian deaths totaled 12, compared to four a year ago, or an increase of 200 per cent. Farrell said the survey of these deaths indicated the greater proportion of them involved children struck while playing in streets or highways, or adjacent to streets or highways.
In many instances, children playing adjacent to streets or highways dashed suddenly into the path of approaching vehicles," Farrell said. "In other cases, children playing in the street were not aware of approaching cars, the drivers of which failed to see them, due to darkness." He suggested children be encouraged to play away from traffic and to use care when crossing streets.

Bank Of Oregon Yearly Resources Up In 1944
SPRINGFIELD—Resources of the Bank of Oregon amounted to \$1,757,000.37 on Dec. 31, 1944, according to an announcement by bank president Harold Edmunds. This is an increase of more than a half million dollars compared with Dec. 31, 1943. The bank has been in operation for five years.
During 1944 the bank's war bond department and ration banking department have been active features of the bank's services. The bank's total debits, which correspond to clearings in larger cities, amounted during 1944 to over \$9,800,000.

He enlisted on Feb. 6, 1944 and received his training at Ft. McClelland, Ala. He was home on a furlough last July and was sent overseas soon after that time.
He was a member of the Cottage Grove and Royal Arch Masons.

ATHENS, Jan. 8.—UP—British armored forces cleared the entire Athens peninsula southeast of the capital today and battled to reduce an ELAS strong point in a mountain defile 25 miles to the northwest.

New York Markets

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The stock market turned around today with rail and industrial specialties getting back into new high ground for the past 7 years on gains running to 3 points or so.
The recovery spur was provided mainly by idle investment funds seeking employment on the further belief that a long war and consequent heavy government expenditures would accentuate inflation psychology and raise prices of securities as well as goods. While top marks were trimmed in several cases near the close, many favorites ended at their day's peaks. Transfers were in the neighborhood of 1,800,000 shares.
In the new high category were Southern Railway, Southern Pacific, N. Y. Central, Pennsylvania, Fajardo Sugar and Omnibus Corp. Climbers included Santa Fe, Chesapeake & Ohio, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, U. S. Rubber, South Porto Rico Sugar, Dome Mines, McIntyre Petroleum, Howe Sound, Westinghouse, American Smelting, Allied Chemical and Douglas Aircraft.
Rail bonds resumed the upswing.

assistance possible in preparation for this service.
The local committee made plans to contact nurses from Lane county who are already serving in the different theaters of war to render them any service possible from the home front.
The negative influence of propaganda was mentioned by the chapter and it was suggested the following test question might be asked when a question arose: "If heard in Tokyo or Berlin, would it please the enemy and make them joyous or would it hurt the feelings of our boys at the front who are spending nights and days in foxholes and lower their morale?" The propaganda would die from lack of our cooperation in spreading it if the suggestion above were universal followed by Americans here at home, Miss Gray stated.
In order to take the required number of nurses from the home front to take care of the wounded, it is eminently important to help cover the home front by helping every woman prepare to take care of minor illnesses in the home. The modern "home nursing course" is being offered in six lessons for this purpose during this emergency, Miss Gray emphasized.
