

Old Numbers Stay On Gas Coupons

Motorists in the Portland OPA district were advised this week by E. W. Eggen, mileage rationing representative, not to change the endorsement on their present gasoline coupons when they get their new motor vehicle registration stickers. They are instructed to leave the old license number endorsement on the coupon, and to use the old license number when they get their new coupons.

Out-of-state motorists now in Oregon, who obtain license plates, are also advised not to change the license number already endorsed on their coupons. These motorists should change their book cover or identification folder of present coupons by drawing a line lightly through the old license plate number and placing the new license plate number above or below.

Also, the license number should be changed on the mileage rationing record which all motorists received from their local boards with their coupon book. These changes should be made in ink, indelible pencil or by typewriter.

Junior Chamber Will Name 1944 Citizen

Junior chamber of commerce week, to be observed throughout the nation during the week of Jan. 14-21, will be celebrated in Eugene with the naming of the junior citizen for 1944 at a formal banquet at the Eugene Hotel Jan. 19.

The banquet will commemorate the 25th birthday of the united states junior chamber of commerce which was organized in St. Louis with 12 organizations as the original nucleus. The Eugene chamber was founded in 1928.

In many communities the junior chamber of commerce has been the leader in organizing veteran rehabilitation centers; in others it was the organizations' members were first to volunteer as blood donors. J. Wayne Nicksel, president of the local organization, said Monday, "Most junior chambers of commerce have received the enthusiastic approval of civic, military, and governmental leaders."

The junior citizens award is open not only to members of the junior chamber, but to any young man between the ages of 20 and 35 who has contributed something outstanding to the community. Last year's junior citizen was Robert C. Broderick, who played a major role in work to control juvenile delinquency.

The public, the distinguished service award key will be presented to the first junior citizen, and several honorable mention awards will be given other outstanding citizens.

The accident prevention division of the state industrial accident commission has inaugurated five series of industrial safety training schools in Lane county, with classes scheduled every evening Monday through Friday.

U. S. National Bank Deposits Set Mark

In its statement of condition to the comptroller of currency as per the official call of December 30, the United States National bank, which maintains a branch in this city, reported deposits of \$480,808.957.86 and resources of \$500,202.013.74. These totals represent all-time "highs" for both deposits and resources.

In deposits, the gain over the corresponding call date of a year ago was \$90,733,187.24. Resources for the 12-month period gained \$92,844,699.20. W. B. Gard, manager of the local bank, indicated that this nationwide area has played a proportionate part in making this record possible.
