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VFW Program Deals With Returned Vets

The 50th in a series of "Speak Up For Democracy" programs being sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars will discuss the problem of the returning veteran.

The broadcast will be heard over station KORE at 4:15 p. m. on Thursday, Jan. 11.

Commander Bryant DeBar of post 293 has announced that the Jan. 11 radio address will be delivered by Lester Hill. In his talk, Hill will point out how the opportunities created by the federal government for educational needs can contribute tremendously to the welfare of the young men who will return to their respective communities from the armed forces.

In commenting on the many plans being fostered by various groups for returning veterans, Commander DeBar predicts that the most of the current veteran aid campaigns will fold up just when the situation becomes most critical — when demobilization becomes fully effective.

"Fortunately for returning veterans," declares Commander DeBar, "organized veteranism is composed of men who are chiefly responsible for existing world war II veteran benefits. As a result, we are familiar with all the laws, rules and regulations which apply to those who will be discharged from our various military branches. Best of all, being veterans ourselves, we know the thinking processes of the man who must adjust himself to civilian routine after regimentation under military regulations."

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Red Cross Board Talks Nurse Problem

Seriousness of the shortage in nurses for army and navy service, home front duty, and in veterans' hospitals was emphasized at the meeting of the executive board of the Lane county chapter, American Red Cross, Tuesday evening.

The chapter here is rallying to do all it can in recruiting nurses for these varied services, one of the major duties assigned to Red Cross nationally being recruitment of nurses.

It was pointed out that nurses for army and navy service in battle areas could qualify to carry on who might not meet requirements at the various veterans' hospitals, which are short of nurses, too.

Along with the need for nurses for army and navy service is the big need to push home nursing programs in order to have adequate care on the home front with so many doctors and nurses away.

Poet Receives Proofs For Seventh Book

Proofs on his new book of poetry, "Brief Waters," were received Monday by Professor Ernest G. Moll, professor of English at the University of Oregon, from the Australasian Publishing company of Sydney, Australia.

The collection of poems deals with aspects of Australian life, the country, the people and local customs.

Professor Moll, an Australian, has been at the University of Oregon since 1928. He spent a year in Australia in 1939-40 as an exchange professor under an arrangement with the education department of New South Wales. "Brief Waters" is his seventh book.

Correspondence Work Reaches New High

Every branch of extension and correspondence study offered by the state system of higher education shows the largest gain ever recorded for the term just ended, according to Dr. Henry E. Stevens, assistant director of the general extension division.

A total of 2,243 students marked an all time high for the Portland center. This included five returning veterans under the GI bill of rights.

State-wide classes in extension, offered in Eugene, Grants Pass, Corvallis, Hood River, Klamath Falls, Pendleton and Salem, totaled 370 students enrolled.

American and Nazi Medics Co-operate

WITH AMERICAN TROOPS NEAR WINGEN, France — (AP) — Doctors worked side by side with German doctors tending American and Nazi soldiers during three days in which the Germans were encircled in the little town of Wingen.

The Germans had captured an American first aid station. During the ordeal several hundred American infantrymen also were trapped in the town and technically were prisoners of the Germans.

One of the American medical corpsmen made a dramatic trip back to our lines with a German corporal to get blood plasma and other medical supplies for both the American and enemy wounded. The medic was Sgt. Charles Chevalier, Bridgeport, Conn.

A joint check showed 30 enemy wounded and seven American wounded.

"We were working on their men and they were working on ours too," the sergeant said.

Others of Chevalier's group included Pvt. Edmund Reardon, Denver, Colo.

The troops in Wingen included Lt. Carl Bryan of Seminole, Okla., PFC Maurice McCormick, Portland, Ore., and Pvt. Dallas Jerome of Grants Pass, Ore.

When American tanks moved into the town the medics hurried all the wounded into the cellar until the fight was over.
