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Lane Agricultural Council To Meet

Final plans have been made for the all-day session of the Lane county agricultural council, to be held Saturday, O. S. Fletcher, county agent, said Wednesday. Agricultural service to veterans, recent trends and future outlook in agriculture in Lane county will be taken up at the meeting.

A change has been made in the program to be carried out. At the morning session Mrs. Azalea Sager, state leader in home demonstration work at the state college, will take the place of Miss Nellie C. Lyle, Lane county home demonstration agent, in leading a discussion on the outlook for family living.

Fred G. Knox, president of the council, will open the meeting, and others on the program, besides Mrs. Sager, are J. R. Beck, extension specialist in land use planning, W. E. Barbee, chairman of the veterans' advisory committee, and County Agent Fletcher.

State Agencies Plan Employee Examinations For Job Applicants

In the development of its policy for the continuous receipt of applications, the merit system council for the public welfare commissions, unemployment compensation commission, state board of health, and the crippled children's division has announced a new series of examinations for Feb. 10.

Included in the group will be field deputy, senior field deputy, and collection attorney for the unemployment compensation commission; statistical clerk and assistant statistician for all three state agencies concerned; and personnel technician for the merit system council in Portland.

Candidates with auditing experience will have a distinct advantage in competition for senior field deputy positions, and attorneys with experience in unemployment compensation are desirable for the collection attorney position. College education and training in testing procedures are necessary for the personnel technician. Statistical training or

experience with statistical procedures will be found to be an asset for the statistical positions. Applications are being accepted and provisional appointments being made for clerical, accounting and casework positions, although examinations for these positions will not be given immediately.

Persons qualifying for positions have the right to state in what location they will accept positions and when they will be available. The merit system provides such features as regular vacations and sick leave privileges as well as salary increases and permanent tenure. Promotion of regular employees is the established policy of operation under the merit system.

Application forms are available at the local county public welfare, health department or unemployment compensation offices. Requests may also be sent direct to the merit system council, 616 Mead building, Portland 4, Oregon. The final date for filing applications for the present series of examinations will be Jan. 27.

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Baker Valley Project Report Delayed

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Baker valley irrigation project, Rep. Stockman (R-Ore.) has been informed, is not susceptible of early construction.

Stockman has been endeavoring to obtain a report on the project from the reclamation service and the army engineers. The project, primarily for irrigation, would include some flood control features on which the army must pass. Reclamation Director Harry W. 20-Year Term Given Creswell Man For Criminal Assaults

Pleading guilty to a charge of statutory offenses, Oakley Sage, 49-year-old resident of the Creswell area, was sentenced by Judge G. F. Skipworth in circuit court Tuesday afternoon to a term of 20 years in the state penitentiary.

Arrested Monday evening, Sage was immediately locked up in the county jail and was arraigned in the Eugene justice court. Justice Howard Brownell placed him under \$5000 bail each on two separate charges and Tuesday afternoon he waived grand jury action and was arraigned in circuit court on an information filed by Dist. Atty. William S. Fort.

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
