

Meeting To Discuss Disaster Plans Set

Meeting to discuss responsibility of the state, county, and city, and of the American Red Cross in time of disaster, will be held at 10 a. m. Jan. 18, county courtroom, 1000 Main St. At this session, each county will discuss planning and disaster plans in Lane county in a series of meetings.

The meeting is one of a series of meetings being held in Oregon state courtrooms in each county because of the lack of coordinated planning for natural disasters in the state, a situation which has been in preparation for some time. It is hoped that these meetings will result in the following results: To

get local governmental authorities to actively participate in planning for disaster relief; to coordinate all local relief resources into one plan; to clarify and delineate the responsibilities and functions in case of disaster for the Red Cross, governmental agencies, civilian defense, and public welfare.

The meeting here will be conducted by Jack Hayes, acting director of the Oregon state council of defense; Loia Howard, director of the Oregon state public welfare commission; Ralph Couch, executive officer of the emergency medical of the Oregon state council of defense; Cecil H. Davis, disaster field representative of the Red Cross.

Notices from here have been sent out by John Dunn, disaster chairman for the Lane county chapter of the Red Cross, and Mrs. Cora Pirtle, executive secretary of the local Red Cross office.
