AnnaBelle Wilkerson Davis, Portland freshman, has been chosen to play the leading feminine role in the University theater play, "Heaven Can Wait," Harry Segall's comedy-fantasy from which the movie took "Here Comes Mr. Jordan." John Moore, Newport Beach, Calif., will play the role of Joe Pendleton, leading male character.

Under the direction of Horace Robinson, assistant professor of speech and dramatic arts, the comedy will be presented by the University theater Feb. 9, 10, 14, 15, 16 and 17. The play will be produced in intimate, or penthouse style, and will be presented on the third floor of Heelinger hall on the University of Oregon campus.

Mrs. Davis is a graduate of Roosevelt high school in Portland and came to the university in the fall as winner of the Aaron Frank scholarship for 1944-45. Mr. Moore is a freshman in the school of journalism.

Choral Director Will Speak Here

Appearing in Eugene on Friday, Jan. 19, will be Dr. Noble Cain, Chicago, one of the foremost choral directors in the United States. Brought here through the efforts of the University of Oregon school of music, Dr. Cain will conduct two meetings, one in the afternoon for high school and college students and their directors, and one in the evening for the church choirs and their directors.

The afternoon meeting, a "sing," will be held for the students in the auditorium at the school of music on the campus at one o'clock. In the evening, at 7:30 Dr. Cain will hold what he calls a "lecture-sing." This meeting also will be in the music auditorium on the campus.

Dr. Cain is a nationally known choral director and composer of choral music. He was one of the first to develop the capella choir in high school, which he started in the high schools in Chicago. He comes to Eugene from Portland, where he has been conducting similar meetings. John H. Stehn of the school of music is in charge of arrangements for his appearances in Eugene.

New Home Nursing Course Will Start

A six-lesson course in home nursing is scheduled to start Jan. 29, and women planning to take the work are asked to register at once with the local Red Cross office, telephone 63. The course is the regular one given under auspices of the American Red Cross.

Starting Jan. 29, 9 to 11 a.m. and 2 to 4 p.m., and on Jan. 31, same hours, the course will run for three weeks on Mondays and Wednesdays.

With the acute shortage of nurses for army and navy service and for veterans hospitals, as well as in civilian hospitals, and effort being made to recruit more nurses for those services, it is more imperative than ever that women on the home front know more about care of the sick in the homes, reports Mrs. Glenn A. Harnden, home nursing chairman, in urging that women sign up for the course.

Red Cross Seeks Workers On Sewing

New appeals are being made for Lane county women to do sewing for Red Cross projects, there being great need now for hospital garments, reports Mrs. Royal Glick, production chairman for the Lane county chapter, Red Cross.

There is much sewing to give out now, and the headquarters are open daily on the regular schedule. Organizations or groups wishing to take out allotments of garments are asked to call at the Red Cross office, 63, and make appointments to get their work.

All workers having work out are asked to get it done as quickly as possible, the need is so great for garments, Mrs. Glick says. There is plenty of yarn at the office too for knitting, and there is a big need now for the army sleeveless, V-necks.

Second Air Medal To Local Transport Flier

First Lt. Joseph Harrell, pilot, 670 Eleventh avenue west, has been awarded an Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal, it was announced at an air transport command base in India. The award was made upon completion of 450 hours of operational flight in transport aircraft over the dangerous and difficult India-China air routes, where enemy interception and attack was probable and expected.

The award was made for the period of service from Nov. 22, 1943, to Aug. 4, 1944.

High Schoolers Hear Symposium Teams

Symposium teams from the department of speech and dramatic arts at the University of Oregon discussed problems of current interest before two social science classes at Roosevelt Junior High school Thursday as the first symposium engagement of the year.

Marjorie Silvia, Wilma Foster and Gloria Cartozian discussed "Post-war Relations Between the United States and Russia" for a 9 a.m. class, and Esther Quier, Floyd Hinton and Barbara Weisz discussed "The United Nations (Dumbarton Oaks) Plan for World Cooperation" for a 1:15 p.m. class. These two topics have been selected as the symposium program for this winter and spring.

A team composed of Miss Quier, Alice Harter, Signe Eklund and Mr. Hinton will discuss the Dumbarton Oaks plan at Westminster House on the campus Sunday, Jan. 14. Teams will appear soon before social living classes of Wilson Junior High school.

Louise Fletcher will discuss juvenile delinquency in Oregon before the Reedsport P-TA Jan. 15. Susan Slater of the speakers' bureau spoke to Girl Reserves of Springfield High school Thursday afternoon on "Inmates," basing her remarks on field trips to state institutions and on a major study in sociology.

Many other requests from schools and civic clubs in western Oregon have been received although no definite engagements have been made. Professor Robert D. Clark, director of symposium teams, said recently. Annually for the past eleven years, symposium teams have appeared before Oregon audiences for 20 or 30 minute engagements, and have been received enthusiastically. Last year this forensic activity was expanded to include a speakers' bureau, whereby individual students present talks or lectures on subjects which they are especially qualified to discuss.

On the Speakers' bureau this year besides Miss Slater are: Miss Virginia M. Beattie, "The Case for Progressive Education," and Miss Patricia McCormack, "Ireland—'Tis the Story of St. Patrick and the Claurions."

There are also openings in the dress design department in both the morning and afternoon classes. This department specializes in dress design, alteration, and millinery. This training is for those interested in dress design and millinery as a trade.

Flying Cross Awarded Lt. Wm. H. Brassfield

The Distinguished Flying Cross recently was awarded to Lt. William H. Brassfield, pilot of a B-27 Mitchell bomber. His wife, Mrs. Barbara M. Brassfield, and their small son reside with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Barker of Junction City.

Lieutenant Brassfield, who also holds the Air Medal received for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight in an attack near Busine, Italy, is stationed in Corsica. The 24-year-old pilot holds seven Oak Leaf Clusters and has been overseas.

His group, which took part in the massive allied air attacks which opened the beachhead of southern France and aided in driving the enemy out of Sicily into northern Italy, has been cited by the President.
