

Tax Justification Seen In Liquor Sales

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Government economists say the record breaking spending of \$7,000,000,000 for alcoholic beverages in 1944 is convincing evidence that income taxes are not too high.

They said unofficially this shows that wartime income tax rates have not had the effect of holding down consumer spending—and they hinted it shows that the total economy might be helped if the tax rates were higher.

This interpretation of the economic significance of liquor buying was only one of the reactions to the estimates of the department of commerce that more than \$7,000,000,000 was paid for spirits, beer and wine.

The estimate is \$1,000,000,000 above such spending in 1943.

HEADQUARTERS, 21ST BOMBER COMMAND, Guam — (Delayed) — Twenty-one men from Oregon who pitched in on the construction of this B-29 airbase in addition to their regular duties, have received a special commendation from Brig. Gen. H. S. Hansell, Jr., commanding general, 21st bomber command.

In less than 20 weeks B-29 Superfortresses were bombing Tokyo from the completed base on Saipan.

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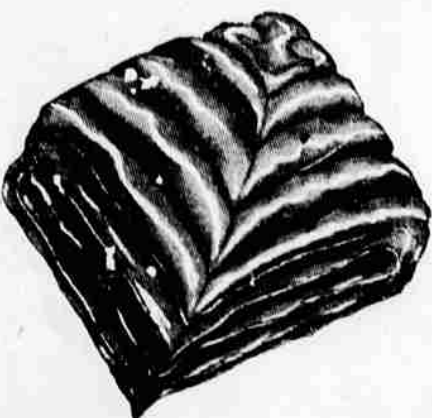
