Nut Growers Hear Specialists Talk

Seventy-five Lane county nut
growers attended a meeting in
the 4-H club building on the
county fairground Wednesday
afternoon, called by the Lane
County Horticultural society, co-
operating with the county agent's
office, to hear discussions led by
specialists from the state college.

Frank Bartholomew, president
of the horticultural society, pre-
sided and introduced the speak-
ers, C. E. Schuster, horticulturist
and nut specialist, and Dr. Paul
W. Miller, plant disease special-
ist, both of the U. S. department
of agriculture and stationed at the
college.

Schuster talked on the filbert
situation and outlook, filbert
worm control and commercial
fertilizers in orchards, while Dr.
Miller's topic was the progress in
controlling walnut and filbert
blight with dusts and sprays.
Following their talks, questions
put by different growers were
answered by the speakers.
