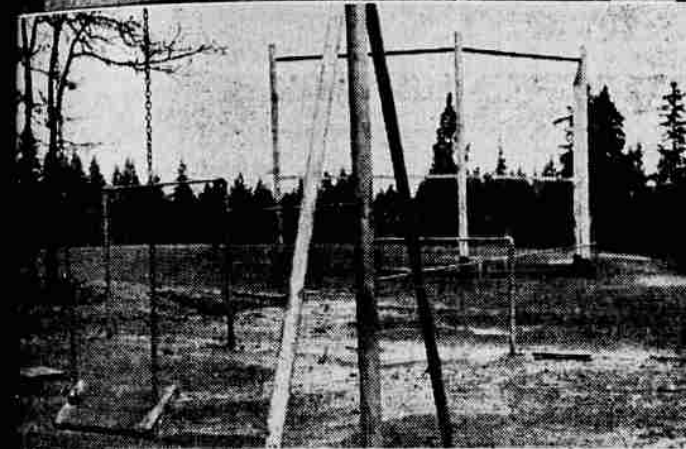

Fats And Oils Join Ration List Monday

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Housewives had the added task today of budgeting ration stamps for fats and oils.

They have three days to do the job, for the OPA last night "froze" until Monday all retail sales of lard, other shortening and salad and cooking oils. When the ban is lifted at that time each of these products will be rationed at two red points a pound.

OPA's action was linked closely with a war food administration directive requiring 40 per cent of total lard output to be set aside for the armed forces.

Butter and margarine, already rationed, are not covered by the sales freeze.

Lawyer Says His Dog Like Elliott's Barred

DETROIT, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Herbert Denis, Detroit attorney, said today that he had purchased in England three years ago a bull mastiff on the same breed as Blaze, the dog shipped from Col. Elliott Roosevelt to his wife, but that the animal had been denied entry into the United States be-

cause of wartime restrictions. "Now Elliott Roosevelt brings one in easily. It's a case of one law for citizens and another for the president's son."

Hoover Asks Lookout For German Spies

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover today sounded an alert for three Nazi espionage agents who, he said, are under orders to enter the United States.

Hoover said the three men have been trained in espionage and sabotage. He asked the nation to be on the lookout for the men and to report any suspicious persons to the nearest FBI office.

Nazi Bridgehead In Italy Smashed

ROME, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Counter-attacking 8th army forces have smashed a small bridgehead which the Germans established on the south bank of the Senio river earlier this week and have driven the enemy back across the stream, allied headquarters announced today.

Headquarters disclosed yesterday that the bridgehead had been established near Fusignano, about 13 miles northeast of Faenza and 14 miles inland from the Adriatic coast.

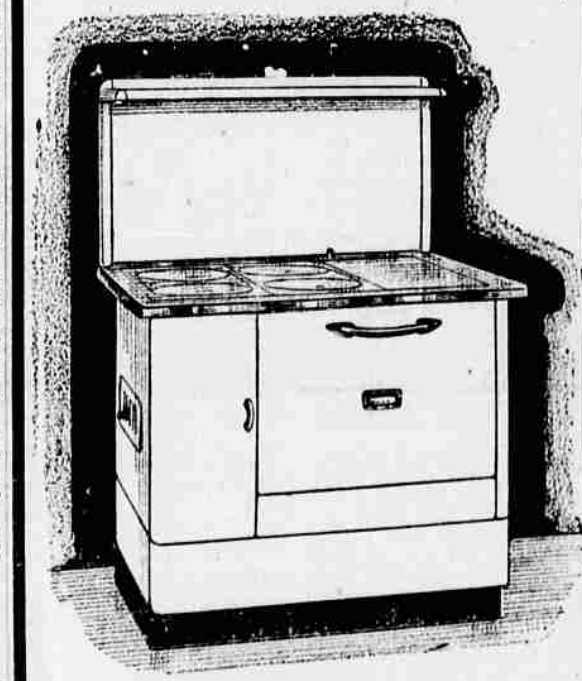
