Proclamation Given For Kiwanis Week

Mayor Earl L. McNutt, in commending the community service activities of Kiwanis International, has issued a proclamation setting aside the period of Jan. 21 to 27 as Kiwanis anniversary week in Eugene.

This event observes the anniversary of its founding in Detroit 30 years ago.

The Eugene Kiwanis club, oldest service group in the city, will hold its special birthday program of the international week on Monday noon. Mayor McNutt's proclamation follows:

"Whereas, cities, towns and villages on the American homefront have assisted in turning the tide of worldwide aggression by supplying food, equipment, medicine and other needs of the united nations' fighting forces, and

"Whereas, Kiwanis International for 30 years has endeavored to strengthen the local community, which has not faltered in the face of the supreme tests of world war II, and

"Whereas, members of the Kiwanis club of Eugene, with 139,000 other Kiwanians in some 2,250 clubs throughout the United States and Canada, have cooperated wholeheartedly in the war effort by purchasing bonds, donating blood, giving their time to draft, ration and other emergency boards, and working in war plants, and

"Whereas, more than 13,000 Kiwanians are serving in the armed forces,

"Now, therefore, I, Earl L. McNutt, mayor of the city of Eugene, do hereby designate the period beginning Sunday, Jan. 21, and continuing through Saturday, Jan. 27, as Kiwanis anniversary week in Eugene and urge all citizens to further strengthen the community and promote the war program by supporting activities such as those carried on by the Kiwanis club of Eugene."

Final Official Nov. 7 Election Vote Talled

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Final official tabulation of the November election returns today showed:

48,025,684 voted for president.
45,103,023 voted for representative.
34,973,613 voted for senator.

The figures are contained in a 54-page pamphlet made public by the clerk of the house. They were compiled from official reports of secretaries of state.

The total popular vote for president added slightly to the previous unofficial aggregate of 47,971,156. The difference is made up entirely of additions to minor party totals.

President Roosevelt had a plurality of 3,596,227 over Gov. Thomas E. Dewey. His official vote was 25,602,505. Dewey polled 22,008,278.

The rest of the popular vote was divided this way: Norman Thomas, socialist, 80,518; Claude A. Watson, prohibition, 74,758; Edward A. Teichert, socialist-labor, 45,336; others, 216,289.

Making up most of the "other" vote was Texas' 135,689, of which 135,439 were polled by the anti-Roosevelt "Texas regulars" and 250 for Gerald L. K. Smith's America first ticket. Smith also polled 1,530 votes in his home state of Michigan.

One of the biggest surprises to political historians was the aggregate vote of 45,103,023 shown for all candidates of the house.

Official compilations of these figures were begun only after the 1942 election and a comparison for the previous presidential year is not available. But it compared with only 28,070,183 cast for representative in the "off-year" of 1942 and is believed to be a big jump over the aggregate for 1940.

The democrats polled only a little more than 1,500,000 votes for representative than the republicans. The totals were: democrats 22,812,611; republicans, 21,303,278. Minor parties fared poorly.

Despite the wartime interruption of normal voting, the total vote for presidential electors was only 1,789,628 shy of the record vote of 49,815,312 in 1940.

Exoneration Sought In Witchcraft Cases

BOSTON.—(AP)—The Massachusetts legislature has been asked to exonerate six persons hanged during the witchcraft delusion at Salem in 1692.

Sen. J. Elmer Callanan filed the petition in the senate in behalf of H. Vance Greenslit of New Orleans, La., a descendant of the family of Ann Pudeator, one of those hanged.

Greenslit sought to clear the name of Mrs. Pudeator but Callanan decided to include the names of five other victims of the witchcraft delusion, Susanna Martin, Bridget Bishop, Alice Parker, Margaret Scott and Wilmot Read.

The petition asked that "the several indictments, convictions, judgments and attainders of witchcraft against said Ann and all other persons be declared null and void as if no such indictments, judgments and attainders had ever been had, returned and entered."

A total of 19 persons died on gallows hill at Salem before the devil became "confused" and pointed to the wife of the governor of the colony as a witch. The governor then ended the persecutions and freed 40 or 50 suspects.

Army Truck Sale Set At Medford

Russell E. Blackburn, regional deputy director of treasury procurement, announces an automotive sale to be held January 24 and 25 at the ordnance service command depot, Medford, Ore.

Vandenberg's Plan Assailed By Communists

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—American communists have begun a blistering campaign of protest against the Vandenberg plan for an Anglo-American-Russian-Chinese treaty to keep Germany and Japan permanently demobilized.

They evidently consider the treaty ideas merely bait for certain post-war political plans to prevent communication of Europe.

The vigor of the American communist objections is causing speculation here whether, by chance, they may be representing the thinking of Moscow in connection with the Vandenberg proposal.

President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and Marshal Stalin will meet within two or three weeks. If Stalin sees the Vandenberg plan as too American communist, it scarcely can figure in any agreements reached at the big three conference.

On Jan. 10 Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg (R., Mich.) proposed that the United States, Great Britain, the Soviet Union and China immediately sign a "hard and fast" treaty to keep Germany and Japan permanently demilitarized.

Chairman Tom Connally (D., Tex.) of the senate foreign relations committee, gave Vandenberg a frosty response. But the Michigan senator's proposal drew considerable bipartisan applause, notably from some of the most consistent supporters of Roosevelt's foreign policy.

American communists, who have been as active as any group in support of the president's foreign policies, took one look at the Vandenberg proposal and began shouting "Foul." Their attacks culminated this week in a Madison Square rally on the 21st anniversary of the death of V. I. Lenin, founder of the communist state.

WFA Orders Apples Held For Military

The war food administration issued WFO 121 requiring handlers of fresh apples grown and located in Washington and Oregon to set aside their holdings of Winesap, Newtown, and Delicious (except Golden Delicious) varieties to meet military and war service requirements.

The order, effective Jan. 15, restricts the sale, shipment or delivery of the three varieties of apples by any person except to a governmental agency, and requires that all apples sold to these agencies be graded and packed in an acceptable manner. It also will provide a plan whereby the required volume will be obtained from shippers on an equitable basis. Quantities not needed to fill war requirements will be released into civilian trade channels. Lots of 5 bushels or less are exempt from the provisions of the order.

WFO 121 was issued to assure availability of high quality northwestern apples in quantities sufficient to meet current needs particularly of the armed forces, both in the United States and in foreign theaters of war. A similar order was issued late in 1943 to obtain the military requirements from the 1945 crop.

WFO 121 requires that all shipments or deliveries of more than five bushels of Washington and Oregon Winesap, Newtown, and Delicious (except Golden Delicious) apples be inspected by an

authorized representative of the federal-state inspection service or some other inspection service approved by WFA.

It also requires that every person owning, controlling, or having in storage 500 bushels of apples report by mail to WFA within seven calendar days after Jan. 15, (1) location, and quantity of varieties of northwestern apples owned by him (2) quantities, by varieties, of such apples produced by him during the 1944 crop year, or acquired by him since Aug. 1, 1944.

Reports should be filed on form FDO 121-1 and mailed to the deputy order administrator, WFO 121, P.O. box 1345, Yakima, Wash. An office will also be opened at Wenatchee, Wash. Report forms will be available at either office.
