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Historical Basis Found For Present Conflict By Durant

Quoting the message of Napoleon to his son: "History is the only true philosophy and psychology," as an opening remark, Dr. Will Durant gave to the new Eugene Knife and Fork club and women guests, at its initial dinner session Friday evening at the Osburn hotel, a masterly review of history from prehistoric era to the present, under the general topic, "What Are the Lessons of History?"

He first viewed history from the biological standpoint, naming the three primordial instincts, or laws of life: struggle, selectivity and fertility, each having its bearing upon events of the world. "The Lord apparently never heard of our American Declaration of Independence, for he continues to create us all unequal." In any group, he declared, 30 per cent will be found to have abilities which total those of the other 70 per cent. In history, it will be found that these minority groups repeatedly bring about a concentration of wealth into so few hands, that eventually the unpossessing group to surpass them in numerical strength, and a revolution is born. "Blow off steam." The world needs its radicals, as a car needs gas, to provide stimulus for movement.

Growth of civilizations in early days was traced, and shown to have been along sea and river routes, and to have been governed for many centuries by sea power. In earliest chronicles, times, in the Mediterranean area; then with the discovery of the new world, a new trade route came into being; strong nations, such as Italy and Spain, declined, and England grew to prominence, mainly because of its colonies in America.

Auto Brings Change
As the automobile contributed to changes in recent decades, and sharpened man's wit and coordination, the airplane is bringing about a change which the speaker envisioned as much more far-reaching. He believes it will establish new trade routes which will give "advantage to the land nations, such as China and Russia," providing means of overcoming the handicap of distance, sources to world use. Russia, as the most self-contained nation, he thinks, will force to immense power by the end of the century. The airplane will bring about a decline of sea power, he predicted, calling this "one of the world's greatest revolutions."

As he traced the history of many races, and their superimposition upon other races, he remarked that great civilizations have grown from the mixture of races into a homogeneous type, and that this is in progress, but not yet achieved, in the United States. Civilization depends "more upon place than race, than beliefs to the contrary."

Governments Credited
Credit to many forms of government, and to specific eras under each, was given, but he quoted Plato in outlining how each of four forms of government has repeatedly brought about its own downfall by carrying to excess its outstanding principle: monarchy giving place to aristocracy, which is supplanted by democracy, which in turn by dictatorship Plato foretold the present history of Italy and Germany, he said.

Civilization depends upon the discipline of religion as well as family and school in forming character for survival, he declared, adding:

"The army is doing for our young men today what our parents have failed to do."

Perhaps most significant of many startling statements was

this: "It is our good fortune that the Japanese attacked us so soon; had they waited another 30 years or so, I believe our history would have been as that of 1929. France lost this war in 1929, when it was decreed by law that Frenchmen must transmit property in equal amounts to all their sons; since when, the average French family has consisted of but one son and one daughter. Our birth rate was going down so fast, in a few years the manpower shortage here would have accounted for our defeat. Our challenge came just in time."

Approximately 200 persons were present at the banquet, at which Dr. Ross J. Griffith of Northwest Christian college served as toastmaster.

FDR's Inaugural Text

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Following is the text of President Roosevelt's fourth inaugural address:

Mr. Chief Justice, Mr. Vice-President, my friends:

You will understand and I believe, agree with my wish that the form of this inauguration be simple and its words brief.

Americans of today, together with our allies, are passing through a period of supreme test. It is a test of our courage—of our resolve—of our wisdom—of our essential decency.

If we meet that test—successfully and honorably—we shall perform a service of historic importance which men and women and children will honor throughout all time.

As I stand here today, having taken the solemn oath of office in the presence of my fellow countrymen—in the presence of our God—I know that it is America's purpose that we shall not fail.

Total Victory Goal

In the days and in the years that are to come we shall work for a just and durable peace as today we work and fight for total victory in war.

We can and we will achieve such peace.

We shall strive for perfection. We shall not achieve it immediately—but we still shall strive. We may make mistakes—but they must never be mistakes which result from faintness of heart or abandonment of moral principles.

I remember that my old schoolmaster said, in days that seemed to us then to be secure and untroubled: "Things in life will not always run smoothly. Sometimes we will be rising toward the heights—then all will seem to reverse itself and start down to the great flat of disaster."

The great fact to remember is that the trend of civilization itself is forever upward; that a line drawn through the middle of the peaks and the valleys of the centuries always has an upward trend.

Foundation Firm

Our constitution of 1787 was not a perfect instrument; it is not perfect yet. But it provided a firm base upon which all manner of men, of all races and colors and creeds, could build our solid structure of democracy.

Today in this year of 1945, we have learned lessons—at a fearful cost—and we shall profit by them.

We have learned that we cannot live alone, at peace; that our own well-being is dependent on the well-being of other nations, far away. We have learned that we must live as men, not as ostriches, nor as dogs in the manger.

We have learned to be citizens of the world, members of the human community.

We have learned the simple truth, as Emerson said, that "the only way to have a friend is to be one."

Mistrust Discouraged

We can gain no lasting peace if we approach it with suspicion and mistrust—and with fear. We can gain it only if we proceed with the understanding and confidence and courage which flow from conviction.

The Almighty God has blessed our land in many ways. He has given our people stout hearts and strong arms with which to strike mighty blows for freedom and truth. He has given to our country a faith which has become the hope of all peoples in an ungodly world.

We pray now to him for the vision to see our way clearly—to

see the way that leads to a better life for ourselves and for all our fellowmen—to the achievement of his will to peace on earth.

We left with another quotation as his final comment on this is—that: "The world has two billion centers; every human heart."
