### OLD PAPER INTERESTS

REEDSPORT—Of interest is a copy of the newspaper "Freedom," published in Manila, Island of Luzon, on Tuesday, March 28, 1899, which is being displayed locally. The paper is the property of Mrs. Harold M. Johanson of Reedport and was sent to her mother, Mrs. William Grubb, by the late Mr. Grubb, who was a member of the second Oregon regiment which took part in the previous Philippines invasion. Headlines of the paper may have covered the battles of today or tomorrow. They read: "Malabon has Fallen" "Old Glory Again Triumphant" "Volunteer and Regular Soldiers Have Taken On Another Coat of Glory and the Well Fortified Insurgent Stronghold Yields to American Arms." "NOW ON TO MALABON" "The great battle of the war has been fought on Luzon soil and gloriously won and at last reports our blue-shirted and battle worn boys were advancing toward the capital. A brilliant though hotly contested movement by our troops—another fierce battle at Pasig." The name of General MacArthur appears frequently, referring to the father of the present General MacArthur.

Of particular interest are the ads, many of places and businesses still in existence or at least in existence before the present war, according to Mrs. Nancy Fields Cole, wife of Lt. Col. Howard Cole, now of Washington, D.C., but for several years a doctor at the Cullon Leper Colony near Manila.
