

Snow Slows Patrols On Italian Front

ROME, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Snowfalls on already snowbound mountain positions limited even patrol activity along the Italian front today—the first anniversary of the historic landings at Anzio.

In the Adriatic sector, an enemy raiding party penetrated two and a half miles into allied lines northeast of Anzio after a heavy artillery barrage, but was thrown back to its original position by 8th army troops.

Patrols were active on both sides of the Senio river. A few allied patrols operating in the 5th army sector northwest of Vergemoli, reported only light contact with the Germans.

Allied headquarters said enemy patrol action had been speeded up on the American front south and southeast of Bologna.

FRENCHMAN'S CREEK

Being brought up strictly in the yo-ho-ho-and-a-bottle-of-rum era of pirate fiction, Mitchell Leisen's production of the novel by Daphne du Maurier strikes us as being more or less a bit of John's Other Wife moved into the seventeenth century.

When a French (Arturo de Cordova) pirate sails his ship into a creek near her country house to which she has retired to forget the boredom of her husband's (Ralph Forbes) company, and that of his friend (Basil Rathbone), Dona St. Columb (Joan Fontaine) falls in love with the pirate, goes on a short expedition on his ship, "La Mouette" (The Swallow), finally realizes her responsibility to society and to her children and returns to the monotony which is everyday life.

And it's all pure and sweet, a la Le Hays office. But we would like to remark that: (a) Pirates don't take women on overnight trips in return for a kiss on the cheek; (b) in sword fights it naturally follows that

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some people are going to get their heads lopped off, or at least scratched, contrary to action in this film; (c) pirates have more brains than to take women on raiding missions; (d) pirates don't bow to one another, or use many formal gestures; (e) no pirate raiding an enemy coast would be foolish enough to paint his ship solid white.

Color photography is excellent throughout. Musical score consists mostly of innumerable variations of Debussy's "Clair de Lune." Despite all the criticisms we can offer, women will go overboard (no pun intended) for this film, will probably insist it's one of the year's best. "It's the romance of every woman's dreams," says the ad. Start dreaming, ladies. "La Mouette" will never make it past the falls at Oregon City.

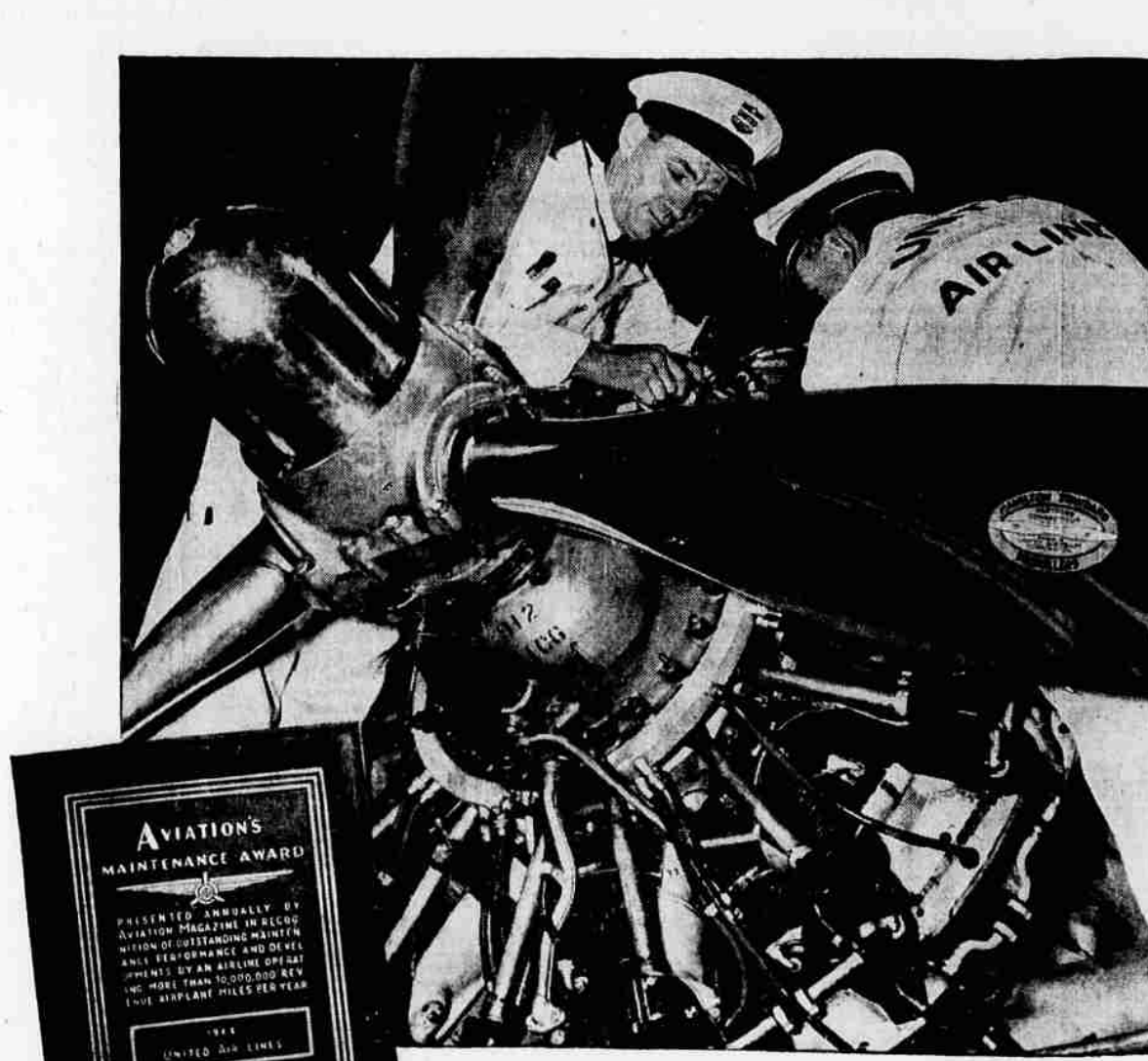
