Lane Contribution
To Chest Disclosed

Lane county people gave \$67,233.73 to the Oregon war chest during the year 1944, according to the financial report from chest headquarters, filed in the office of the county clerk, as provided by law.

Lane county is second to Multnomah in the amount contributed to the chest. Multnomah being credited with \$549,396.78. Marion county, which has a population near that of Lane, reported the surprising low figure of \$3999.07. Contributions of some of the other larger counties are given as follows: Clackamas, \$33,726.14; Clatsop, \$26,456.40; Coos, \$42,090.72; Jackson, \$61,439.44; Klamath, \$61,977.82; Umatilla, \$25,501.62.

Total contributions throughout the state were \$1,169,674.46, and the expenditures, \$1,149,824.34, leaving a balance of \$24,973.65, the report shows.
