## Parents Get First Word From Son Since 1941

MEDFORD, Jan. 25—(AP)—The parents of Jack M. Hancock, 26, have received their first word from their son since December, 1941, when he was taken as a civilian prisoner by the Japanese on Wake Island.

Mr. and Mrs. Melvin C. Hancock, Gold Hill, have received a typewritten card signed by him from the Fukuoka prisoner of war camp, island of Honshu. The Hancock said Red Cross publications state only two previous messages have come out of Fukuoka.

local staff to advise people on their eviction rights. "However, the salient factors may be pointed out. Any notice to vacate rented dwelling units must comply with the federal rent regulations and if it does not, it is invalid. The federal rent regulations do not prevent evictions, but limit them to seven grounds. One of the purposes of the regulations is thus to prevent unlawful evictions which tend to circumvent the regulations."

Another rule which Gage pointed out requires that copies of all eviction notices sent tenants also must be sent to the local area rent office within 24 hours. Also, the rule states specifically: "At the time of commencing any (court) action to remove or evict a tenant—the landlord shall give written notice thereof to the area rent office, stating the title of the case, the number of the case where that is possible, the court in which it is filed, the name and address of the tenant, and the ground under this section under which removal or eviction is sought."

Persons with serious eviction problems, solutions of which cannot be deferred until the area office is opened, are advised to consult or write the associate rent director, Corvallis rent control office, OPA, Corvallis, Gage said. Problems which can wait, however, should be held until the local rent staff is established here, which will be sometime shortly after Feb. 1.

## State 4-H Leaders' Program Received

All 4-H club leaders in Lane county are being sent from the office of E. A. Danielson, county club leader, a copy of the program of the state 4-H club leaders' conference, to be held at the state college at Corvallis Feb. 2 and 3. The conference is sponsored by the extension service.

This is the annual conference which was discontinued during 1943 and 1944, but because of popular demand arrangements were made to hold it again this year.

Danielson in a letter to the club leaders says that they may use his office in the courthouse as a headquarters, so that a group can get together in case anyone does not have a full carload of going from any community.

H. C. Seymour, state club leader, sends this word to the leaders planning to attend the conference: "If you have anyone in your county, club members or others, who either sing or play musical instruments and who could take part in some of the programs, we would appreciate having them. Bring them along, and we can fit them into our different sessions and also in our evening program."
