11,825 Arrested By  
Police Here In '44

Eugene's police department made 11,825 arrests in 1944, and collected \$13,501.30 in fines, Chief C. F. Bagman's annual report revealed this week.

A total of 1,016 accidents within the city limits resulted in three deaths and injury to 92 persons, the report showed. Last year ended with 870 accidents; one death; 93 injured.

All of the 73 persons reported missing during the year were located; and the 36 runaway boys and girls reported were returned. Traffic violations numbered 12,536 for the year, with 10,667 arrests and \$11,161.30 in fines collected.

Other arrests were: drunks, 749, fines \$1440; reckless and drunken drivers, 16, fines, \$2500; disorderly conduct, 15, fines, \$325; assault and battery, three, \$75; hit and run drivers, 2; on warrants, 25; break and enters, 6; intent to kill, 1; auto theft, 9; larceny, 11; shoplifting, 5; investigation, 93; forgery, 7; after hours (juveniles), 91; army-navy deserters and no draft papers, 38; trespassing (S.P. company), 60; vagrancy, 9; for FBI, 6; contributing to delinquency of a minor, 1; escaped convict, 1; larceny from person, 1; observation, 3; for outside cities, 3.

Cases: Break and enters, 47; 16 cleared. Stolen bicycles, 275; 245 recovered. Stolen cars, 127; 127 recovered. Larceny from cars, 144; 19 cleared. Larceny from houses and public buildings, 106; 16 cleared. Larceny from porches and yards, 24; 4 cleared. Hold-ups and robbery, 6. Purse-snatching, 1; 1 cleared. Doors found open, 155; all locked. Cars recovered for outside cities, 13. Bicycles parked on sidewalk brought to police station, 75.

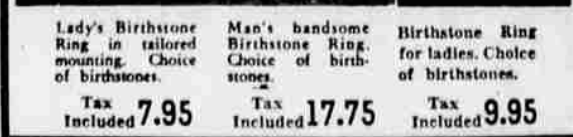
