Mexican Girl Talks To Eugene Group

"We women have the voice, but not the vote in Mexico," was the quick response which vivacious Hella Morrell, a Mexican national and student of the law school at the University of Mexico, made to her interpreter, Dr. L. O. Wright, when asked about women's rights. The visitor from the south answered questions and spoke informally at the international relations group of the League of Women Voters, Wednesday evening, at the First Congregational church.

Dr. Wright gave a brief background of our relations with the republics of south and central America and expressed the opinion that they wished we would keep in our place. "It is one thing to be a big brother, and another to wield a big stick," he pointed out the opportunity we had at the present time to be good friends with the Mexican nationals who are in this country to help us during the war period.

Miss Morrell, who gave answers in Spanish to the questions put to her, said, "Laws in Mexico are made by men for men, but we women think there are a number of things which can be improved by our having a voice in government." She said some progress has been made and under the present administration women are holding some government posts.

Dr. Wright asked her, "When you get the vote, what do you believe you can do?"

Miss Morrell: "Reform the world."

Dr. Wright: "Excellent, but where will you start?"

Miss Morrell: "In Mexico."

Dr. Wright: "What are you hoping for in the peace—shall all nations be treated equally?"

Miss Morrell: "Oh, if we could trust each other, but we have to face the facts."

Dr. Wright: "What would do with Argentina?"

Miss Morrell, quickly: "I'd rather not talk about that."

The guest speaker was so keen in her response that even those who understood no Spanish were able to get much of the meaning, and catch her humor which was interspersed freely throughout the interview. Miss Morrell, who is visiting her mother, Mrs. Graham of Cottage Grove, expects to return to Mexico very soon to resume her studies.

Bill Would Raise Lane D. A.'s Salary

Lane county is listed among counties whose district attorneys would receive boosts in salaries in a bill introduced by Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland, democrat, at the legislature this week.

Lane county's district attorney now receives \$2700 and under the proposed bill the salary would be \$3240. Other counties listed in the bill are Multnomah county, a boost to \$5700; Marion county, to \$3240; Klamath and Grant to \$3000 each; Baker and Douglas, \$2760 each; Benton and Josephine, \$2580 each.

Use Of Captured Patents Explained

Captured enemy patents are available to small businessmen for use in production improvements and production increases, declared Roy Shavcross, alien patent custodian, at a meeting of the Small or War Plants Corporation in Eugene Thursday night.

The meeting was jointly sponsored by the Lane County War Industries, Inc., and the industries committee of the Eugene chamber of commerce.

Others who spoke before an audience of some 50 local businessmen and manufacturers were George Moscrip, Portland area manager of the SWPC, and Ted Cramer, finance officer, who explained how to get additional funds for improvements and new machinery in war plants.
